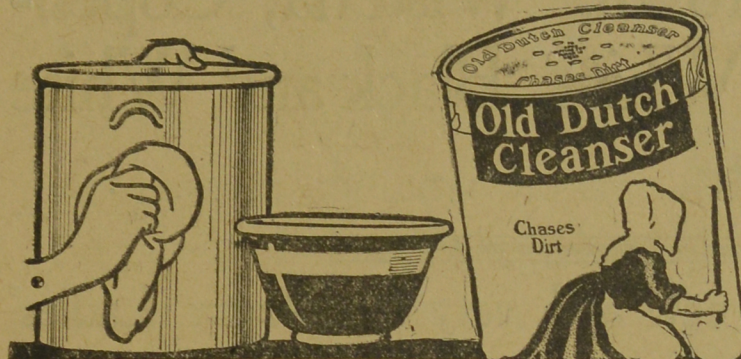

SONS OF ENGLAND IN PROSPEROUS STATE

Financial Statement Shows Receipts
of \$417,210 and Disbursements
of \$259,296.

Halifax, Aug. 11.—The Supreme
Lodge of the Sons of England Benefit
Society continued in bi-ennial session
on Thursday morning but adjourned at
noon to accept the hospitality of the
lodges of Halifax and Dartmouth.

The report of the Supreme Secretary
showed a total membership of 32,586,
of whom 4,600 are overseas—a proud
record. Ten new lodges have been
established since the last meeting, viz.,
at Golden, B. C., Montreal, Fort Will-
iam, St. John, Kingston, Ont., Toronto,
Saskatoon, Mount Dennis, Ont., Swift
Current (Sask.) and Schreiber, Ont.

The total cash receipts for the past
year were \$417,210, and the disburse-
ments covered sick benefits for 17,035
weeks. The cash to the credit of sub-
ordinate lodges on December 31st last
was \$259,296.

The total number of beneficiary
members is 4,017. The death claims
paid last year totalled \$61,977, and
since the inception of the society
\$923,932.

The sessional papers were consid-
ered. A suggestion from the Ottawa
lodges that the vote on the Supreme
Lodge should be by lodge membership,
was negated.

The funeral levy was increased by
twenty cents—the suggestion coming
from Lodge Shakespeare, Winnipeg.

After luncheon the majority of the
delegates crossed to the Dartmouth
side of the harbor, where they were
met by automobiles and conducted to
Tobin's Grove, Woodlawn, for a picnic.

There were not less than 2,000 persons
on the grounds.

Some of the delegates were guests
of A. B. Crosby, ex-M. P., to a harbor
trip. A special visit was paid to the
new terminal works and the visitors
were amazed to see what is being ac-
complished. The delegates were con-
ducted along the water front, past the
warships in port and finally landed at
Dartmouth and proceeded to the picnic
grounds.

A NEW ELEMENT IN POISONING CASE

Poison Taken by Mrs. Taken by Mrs.
Davis Not the Kind That Killed
Her Husband.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—A new element
was presented today in the mystery
surrounding the death at a Michigan
Avenue hotel last Wednesday of Mr.
Morse Davis, a mining engineer of
Vancouver, B. C.

It was the announcement made last
night that Dr. William D. McNally, a
coroner's chemist, in a chemical an-
alysis of the contents of the stomach
of Mrs. Davis, who was found uncon-
scious at the time of her husband's
death, had discovered no poison of the
kind believed to have killed Davis.

The chemist said he would make
further tests for other poisons, and
that he would analyze several bottles
of medicine found in Davis' apartment.
Mrs. Davis, after she had gained
consciousness, was quoted as saying
that a chemical that her husband used
in a professional work must have got-
ten mixed with salts which she and
her husband took for illness.

Mrs. Davis is still ill.

TO NAME TUNNEL AFTER CONNAUGHT

His Royal Highness, the Duke of
Connaught, Governor General of Can-
ada, has at request of Lord Shaugh-
nessy, graciously allowed the tunnel
which the Canadian Pacific Railway
bored under the Selkirk mountains to
be named after him. The "Connaught
Tunnel," which is five miles long, and
double tracked, gives the Canadian
Pacific Railway the lowest grade of any
transcontinental line through the Sel-
kirks.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Con-
naught went through this tunnel on the
17th July last, when the bore had been
completed.

The tunnel was bored in less than
three years and therefore holds the
world's record for tunnelling. The per-
manent tracks are now being laid in
the tunnel and trains will be running
through it very shortly.
