## SLOW PROGRESS IN ORPET MURDER TRIAL

Murderer of Murdered Girl Says She  
Was of a Happy Dis-  
position.

Waukegan, Ill., June 17.—Judge Donnelly, who is hearing the case of Hill H. Orpet, the University student who is charged with the murder of his former sweetheart, Marion Lambert, expects to decide today whether he will call Percy Longland as the court's own witness in the case.

Attorneys for the state asked yesterday that Longland be summoned and the jury was excused late in the day, while the opposing counsel argued before the judges as to the state's request, the defence entering a violent objection. Longland is employed on the Cyrus McCormack estate by E. O. Orpet, father of the defendant and superintendent of the estate. He had charge of the greenhouse in which a can of cyanide of potassium was kept, at the time of the girl's death.

Attorney Dady said that Longland told him that Mr. Orpet had ordered him about Christmas to throw the poison away, as it had deteriorated to such an extent that it was of no value. Longland said he had forgotten to do so, but that a few days after Marion Lambert's death Orpet told him to throw the poison in the ash heap and forget that he ever saw it. Dady said this was before it was known that Marion had died of cyanide poisoning.

Mrs. Frank Lambert, mother of the dead girl, occupied the witness stand for a short time yesterday and testified that Marion was always of a happy disposition. The mother contradicted the story told by Josephine Davis, that her daughter was sad on her birthday night, a short time before her death.

Private Vallar was an English immigrant boy who made his home for some years with Conn. James G. Douglass. He is the owner of a farm near Stanley, which he abandoned to go and fight for his country. He went to England last summer with a draft from the 55th Battalion and, volunteering for service at the front, was sent to France with another draft. He had been in the trenches about three months. Private Vallar comes of a fighting family. He had a brother killed in the South African war and two brothers have been killed in this war, while another will go overseas with the 104th Battalion.

Private Allan Kelley.

Private Havelock Kelly, of the 4th Pioneer Battalion, has been notified that his son, Private Allan Kelley, has been wounded in action. He was shot in both legs and is now in hospital.

## POLICE INVESTIGATION BEGAN ON SATURDAY

Will Continue on Monday Next—Two  
Charges Heard on Saturday  
Afternoon.

The Police Commission sat Saturday afternoon for the purpose of hearing and investigating charges preferred against Chief of Police McCollom. The Commission will continue the investigation on Monday next. The findings of the Commission are private. Chief of Police McCollom was before the Commission are private. Chief of Police charges made, namely, that he had been a frequenter of a house in Queen Street West and that he had had improper conduct at the police station with a woman who was under arrest at the time as a street-walker. Chief McCollom was not present while witnesses were examined. Those making the charges, ex-Police Sergt. William Duncan and ex-Policeman William Saunders, were present only when giving evidence.

A number of witnesses were examined. They were residents of Fredericton. It is understood that application has been made for the summoning of witnesses from St. John and also that a protest has been made to the attorney general by those who made the charges because they have not been given the right to cross-examine witnesses.

Other charges against Chief McCollom are to be heard, also charges against Policeman Charles Marshall.

## British Admiralty Extradited Lincoln

London, June 19.—Ignatius T. T. Lincoln, the former member of parliament, who is on trial in the Bow Street police court on the charge of forgery, established the fact today that it was the British Admiralty which indirectly was responsible for his extradition from the United States.

Lincoln, who is conducting his own defence, brought this out in cross-examining Seebohm Rowntree, whose name the prisoner is charged with having forged.
