me a promise?"

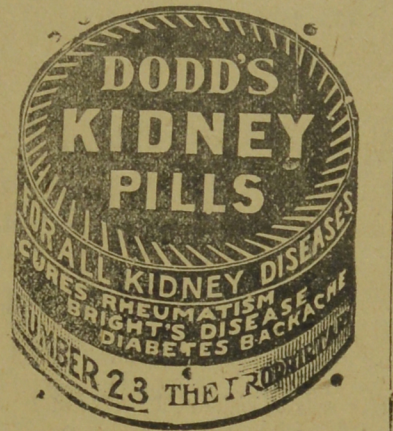
"Of course I will," he answered,

## -Woman's Column-

### RHUBARB HINTS.

Rhubarb pudding is made this  
way: Butter a baking dish and in  
the bottom put three slices bread  
which have been dipped in hot wa-  
ter. Fill the dish with rhubarb  
stalks cut into small pieces and  
generously sprinkled with sugar  
and grated lemon peel. Sprinkle  
the top with bread crumbs and su-  
gar and bits of butter and bake un-  
til brown.

Rhubarb tarts are delicious when  
made like this: Cut rhubarb en-  
ough to measure three cupfuls in-  
to small pieces and mix with the  
juice and grated rind of a lemon, a  
tablespoonful of water, cupful of  
sugar and stew gently until tend-  
er. Bake good pie paste in muffin  
tins, cool these tart shells. When  
the rhubarb is cool fill the shells  
and cover with a meringue or a  
spoonful of whipped cream.

For rhubarb jelly proceed in this  
way: Weigh eight pounds of stalk,  
wash, dry and cut into small pieces,  
but do not pare it. Put it in an  
earthen jar with the rind of three  
lemons cut into thin strips. Cover  
and place in the oven until tender.  
Let it drain through a jelly bag  
and add the juice of three lemons  
and boil gently for twenty-five  
minutes. Measure the juice and to  
four cupfuls add five of sugar. The  
sugar should be heated in the oven  
before the sugar is added until  
it has reached the jelling stage.

### PINK BLOUSES BECOMING.

The pale pink blouse seems to  
maintain its hold upon woman's

fancy, and, in spite of the new  
models in bisque, cream and pale  
blue, three pink blouses are sold  
to every one in another shade.  
There is something peculiarly fem-  
inine and appealing about the deli-  
cate pink blouse, and well does  
women admire its becomingness.  
The only trouble about these dainty  
blouses is their proclivity to  
"wash out," not a good, wearable  
white, that is by no means bisque  
or cream. The handy woman  
knows what to do about this: she  
keeps on hand a supply of ordin-  
ary rose-colored crepe paper, tears  
off a few scraps, and "pinks" the  
rinsing water for her blouse. The  
delicate tint will wash out again,  
to be sure, but it is a simple mat-  
ter to "pink" the rinsing water  
each time the blouse is laundered.  
This may offer a hint to the wom-  
an who fancies a pale pink tint,  
also, in crepe de chine undergar-  
ments, or who has a pair of white  
silk stockings that she would like  
to turn pale pink for use with a  
pink evening frock.

### DAINTY FICHUS.

Fichus seem peculiarly appropriate  
with the Quaker gray frocks of the  
season. Any woman can look demure  
no matter what her type, in a little  
frock of dove gray crepe de chine or  
pussy willow silk, with a fine batiste  
or net fichu over her breast.

Some of these fichus are daintily  
hand-embroidered; others have tiny  
frills of pleated net at the edge, and  
usually there are cuffs to match the  
fichu.

A famous modiste presents an after-  
noon frock of plain and striped taffeta  
whose bodice is almost hidden under a  
big crossed fichu of sheer embroidered  
batiste. The three-quarter sleeves have  
deep cuffs of the same material.
