## BRIDGE WORKMEN BECAME ALARMED

Had a Premonition That Something Was Going to Happen Before Disaster Occurred.

Quebec, Sept. 20.—A number of the workmen on the Quebec bridge became alarmed and left work just before the central span collapsed on Sept. 11th, with a loss of thirteen lives, it was said at the inquest of Coroner Jolicoeur on the body of Edwin Jourdenais of Providence, R. I., one of the victims, this morning.

It was stated in evidence that some of the men on the hydraulic jacks on the south shore, where the span first gave way, went home to breakfast, and failed to return to work, as they should have done.

Men in charge of the work, however, swore that plenty of experienced help remained to operate the jacks, which were not responsible for the accident, which was caused by the breaking of a universal socket or casting supporting one end of the span on the girder to which the elevator chains were attached. The much argued point whether the span itself buckled was settled by expert testimony. It was shown that the steel work gave way, but only after the span was tilted.

The expert testimony went to show that the same method of elevating the span will be used next year, when a new link will be prepared.

The jury found that Jourdenais came to his death accidentally. The question of the reliability of the method of hoisting the span was not considered, as it was outside the province of the coroner.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.
