OPPOSITION IN CARLETON CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS

Hot Campaign Closed Last Night With Several Rousing Meetings—Government Forces Are Well Supplied With the Sinews of War—George B. Jones, M.P.P. on Hand to do His Bit—Keen Interest in Result Manifested by the Electors.

Woodstock, Sept. 20.—The campaign is over tonight. Tomorrow the votes will be piled and counted. The air seems full of Opposition spirit, full of the hope for better things and better government.

The result will show how Carleton county people view the sins of the men who have led New Brunswick into the mire of dishonesty and corruption. If the vigorous spirit of the Opposition, if the keenness of committee work, the care of organization, count for anything, McCain and Upham will be elected. If the money—big chunks of P.—distributed by Government agents and brought here by other members of the Legislature and men higher up, is more potent than the sentiment back of honest and pure dealing in our government business, the bootlickers will be given further hope and further license.

Desperate Workers.

A somewhat significant circumstance was the arrival of another manipulator, George B. Jones, M.P.P., today at noon. With Murray, Landry, Baxter, Flemming and Smith, Jones, Woods, Price and Burke—surely the list is nearly complete. But that the people are aroused is shown by the size of the Opposition meetings. The county has been covered thoroughly and as many as five meetings a night have been held by the Opposition. There have been "repeats" covering the same ground again, to answer the campaign of misrepresentation of the Government speakers. Their trouble has been lack of argument. No man can defend graft. They cannot point to what the Government has accomplished. Therefore they have resorted to abuse, and Carvell and Carter are the principal targets for bitter attacks and falsehoods. This has disgusted people, and the falsehoods have been so flagrant that even rank government men felt that much harm was done by them.

Colonel Baxter Wrathful.

Hon. Mr. Baxter last evening, at Bristol broke loose and could not find language adequate to describe his feelings towards Carvell and Carter. The engraving of that famous \$500 check that he gave back adorns the plate-glass windows and the barns and the fences of Carleton county, and as he whirled by in his motor car, driving

from one parish to another, and gazes upon Gould's fee, he has an opportunity to remember and reflect. When speaking at Bristol he tried to revive that old canard of how the Opposition (he was careful not to mention names) had been willing to hush up the Dugal charges against Flemming for \$10,000.

He dilated upon his part in the investigation and made the bitter remark that "George W. Fowler wasn't man enough to back him up" when he made the charge in his evidence or statement before the royal commission. There were plenty in the audience who remembered that the colonel talking to them wasn't at the front, while Colonel Fowler, whom he was talking about was overseas.

Colonel Baxter took occasion to refer to Messrs. C. W. Robinson, F. J. Sweeney and Hon. W.P. Jones as "men of honor" whom he was willing to have pass judgment upon his acceptance of the \$500 from Gould.

A voice—"You'll get badly left."

The soldiers of the 140th Battalion living in Carleton county are all here, votes or no votes. The boys for better government have been crowing since the party left Quebec over how they were included in the home visitation. They won't forget F. B. Carvell.

Flemming a Dead One.

How are the mighty fallen! Flemming spoke at Jacksonville Saturday evening to twelve voters. Fred Squires was with him. At Simonds last night Squires and Hartley spoke to five voters and six ladies. Baxter had what has been termed the "auto audience." The government workers like the automobile rides and oyster suppers, and make a meeting and a minister (government) provide the excuse.

Every Opposition man feels he has done his duty in this contest. There have been no methods anyone can be reproached for. The managers of the campaign have made it clean. There has been greater expense than usual for motor cars and printing, for travelling expenses and the providing of dinners. There is nothing in the law against these expenditures, and the tremendous campaign fund of the Government has made it necessary to offset it by more meetings, more canvassing and greater attention to every detail.

Many Canadians On Hand? Roll

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—Though not in comparison with St. Julien, Givenchy and Festubert, Canadian successes at the front this week were accomplished at a very heavy toll of casualties.

The militia department is still without details of the fighting, but word has come that in the latest engagements 400 Canadians were killed, 1,200 wounded and 300 missing.


