GOVERNOR'S "AT HOME" WAS LARGELY ATTENDED

About Two Hundred Present Last Night
 ---Final Reception Next
 Wednesday.

GOVERNOR'S RECEPTION

The "At Home" given at the Queen Hotel last night by His Honor the Lieut. Governor was most enjoyable. About two hundred invited guests from Fredericton and other places were in attendance. Music was furnished by McKnight's Orchestra. The "At Home" began at nine o'clock. At eleven o'clock an impromptu dance began, continuing until twelve. Supper was served in the dining room at 9.45. Mrs. George J. Clarke, wife of the Premier, assisted Mrs. Wood in receiving.

The social functions of the present legislative session are drawing to a close. Next week, the final reception will be held Wednesday afternoon.

FLEMMING'S STATEMENT WAS NOT CORRECT

In the House on Thursday, Hon. Dr. Landry, in reply to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry:

1. In the preamble to the Act Chapter 9, 5 George V., re the St. John and Quebec Railway Co., passed last year, it is stated, "And whereas this proceeds of the sale of the said debenture stock so deposited with the Prudential Trust Company, Ltd., were available for the construction of the said line of \$4,037,500." Will the Government say how this amount was arrived at? Answer—The amount was arrived at by allowing \$1,500 per mile for interest during period of construction, and allowing \$22,250 per mile for construction, in all amounting to \$4,037,500. It was figured that the bonds sold at 95 per cent., but the bonds actually sold at 95 1/2 per cent.

2. Is it true that the Prudential Trust Company reported the proceeds of the sale of these debentures as \$4,069,362.54, and Hon. Mr. Flemming in reply to a question reported officially on page 30 Appendix to Debates, 1914, gave the amount \$4,069,362.54?

Answer—Yes.

3. How is the difference in these statements explained and which is correct?

Answer—The difference is explained in the answer to question No. 1, and \$4,069,362.54 is the correct amount.

WEEKLY RECEPTION.

The weekly reception of His Honor the Lieut. Governor at the Queen on Wednesday afternoon was largely attended. Mrs. Wood was assisted in receiving by Miss desBarres, Miss Hunter and Miss Fawcett of Sackville.

ADDRESSED INSTITUTE.

Major C. G. Pincombe addressed the Women's Institute at Welsford Wednesday night. About forty ladies and twenty Boy Scouts were present. An honor roll containing the names of three nurses and forty-three men of the Parish of Petersville now serving in the war was unveiled with appropriate ceremony.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS.

Capt. R. A. Brennan, musketry staff officer for the 6th Division, inspected the infantry here in musketry yesterday. Major General Benson is expected to be here for inspection next Monday. Major F. A. God returned to Fredericton Wednesday night from St. John, where he sat on a board of inquiry on the riots last Friday. Seven recruits have come from St. John to join C Company, 140th Battalion.

TOBIQUE LOG DRIVING CO.

The annual meeting of the Tobique Log Driving Company was held at St. John Wednesday. The following directors were elected: F. C. Beatey, Donald Fraser, Archibald Fraser, J. D. McLaughlin and H. Usher Miller. The officers elected were F. C. Beatey, president, and J. C. Hartley, secretary-treasurer. A contract was entered into with J. D. McLaughlin for the driving of the logs.

LIVE GAME PICTURES.

Moving picture films of live game, taken at Salmon Brook Lake last year by Mr. Bennett, official photographer for the C.P.R., were shown at a local picture house last evening and were watched with much interest by a large audience. Members of the Legislature, members of the Tourist Association, city officials and members of the Crown Land Office staff were present on invitation from Mr. W. H. Allen, president of the New Brunswick Guides' Association, who secured the loan of the film from the C.P.R. The camera caught a number of fine specimens of moose, wallowing about in the water, and a camping scene was also shown. It was a very valuable lesson in natural history and made a great hit with the audience.

EVIDENCE AGAINST POLICE-MAN SAUNDERS HEARD

Police Commission in session this Morning--Evidence Taken Under Oath.

The Police Commission was in session this morning. Its deliberations had to do with Policeman William Saunders. A large number of witnesses gave evidence which was taken under oath. Miss Mary C. McCarthy is official stenographer during the inquiry. The proceedings of the Commission were a continuation of Tuesday morning's session, when the clash between Chief McCollom and Policeman Saunders in the police station was investigated. Chief McCollom at the time charged the policeman with being drunk. He denied the accusation. Witnesses on both sides were examined this morning. Other charges against Policeman Saunders, which were investigated, were that he took a prisoner from a military escort and also that he assaulted Private Ernest Bubar of the 140th Battalion, in a cell at the police station after he had been arrested.

Chairman Wm. McKay stated to The Mail this afternoon that evidence in these three matters and in general charges against the policemen had been taken up by the Commission.

"Have you reached a decision?" he was asked.

"Not for publication," was the reply.

GROWING OF FLAX DISCUSSED BY AGRICULTURAL COM.

The Committee on Agriculture met this morning at ten o'clock with Mr. Young, M.P.P., the chairman, presiding. There was a good attendance. The committee spent the entire morning on a general talk of agricultural subjects. Secretary Daggett was present and answered several enquiries of the members. The chief topics discussed were those relating to the growing of flax in this province and the sheep husbandry.

As regards the former the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas the Dominion Government are making experiments with growing of flax, we, the members of the Committee, commend the attention of the Provincial Agricultural Department to that experiment, with a view to reviving the industry in this Province."

The following resolution was also unanimously adopted:

"That the Chairman of the Committee invite Mr. R. P. Steeves, Director of Elementary Agricultural Education, to come and address the members of the Legislature in the Assembly Room on the subject of Agriculture between the hours of two and three o'clock in the afternoon on a date to be arranged."

The Committee adjourned to meet again at the call of the chair.

FOR THE BELGIANS.

To-morrow being the birthday of the heroic King Albert of Belgium, the members of the Women's Volunteer Reserve will celebrate it by soliciting subscriptions for the Belgian fund. Citizens who feel like contributing to this most worthy object should have their cash ready when the girls in khaki put in an appearance.

ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE.

Mary Howe of St. Mary's, who was sentenced a few days ago on the charge of vagrancy and street walking, was given a sentence of thirty days in gaol this morning by Sitting Magistrate McCready. Sentence was suspended on condition that she stay out of the city.

THE DENTAL BILL.

A bill to amend the Dental Act was before the Law Committee of the House Thursday afternoon. A provision in the measure that prevents any dentist from employing an unqualified assistant was opposed by Mr. F. R. Taylor, K.C., on behalf of Dr. J. D. Maher. Another feature of the bill provides heavy penalties for dentists who practice without being registered.

MILITARY CHANGES.

Lieut. E. J. Cronin has been appointed musketry officer for C Company, 140th Battalion, and will act in that capacity during the stay of the company in Fredericton. Lieut. R. B. McFarlane will command No. 11 Platoon while Lieut. Cronin is on musketry. Major Good, officer commanding the company, has asked for another subaltern to be attached to the company.


