tioning, the witness stated that Bar-
ker had entered the Royal Bank and
asked him if a man made a cheque on
a bank in which he had no funds
would the cheque be good. The wit-
ness had replied it would not. This
evidence caused much amusement
among the spectators.

Asked if he wished to make a state-
ment, Barker said that he had told
the boy when he gave him the cheque
that it was no good and he had gone
to a bank before that and found out
that cheques he might give would be
no good.

HAD NO COUNSEL.

Barker had no counsel in court this
morning and in response to the
magistrate, said he had no funds with
which to retain counsel. Mr. R. B.
Hanson appeared for the prosecution.
Barker appeared to appreciate the
seriousness of his position, although
he did not offer a defence. Many
spectators attended the trial.

OPERATES LIKE ANDREWS.

The Amherst Guardian comment-
ing on the case, has the following:
"Operating in a way that suggests
that he is none other than B. E. An-
drews, who swindled merchants and
house owners in Springfield, Sackville
Chatham and other Maritime Pro-
vince towns at different times during
the past two years, a young man call-
ing himself 'Harold E. Barker' and
describing his father as 'the late L.
W. Barker, barrister, of Amherst,'
recently spent a few days in Frederic-
ton and on his sudden departure left
behind him a number of unpaid bills,
a trail of worthless cheques and a re-
putation among a number of young
boys as a dandy entertainer."

**Statute of Lincoln
Unveiled At Chicago**

(Canadian Press.)
Chicago, Ill., Feb. 12—The unveil-
ing of an historic statue of Abraham
Lincoln marked the celebration of
Lincoln's birthday in Chicago. The
statue, which has been placed on a
sunken lawn at the Stock Yards Ex-
change, is the work of Paul F. Jelde,
a Norwegian sculptor, and was pur-
chased by dime contributions from
virtually all employees at the Chi-
cago Union Stock Yards.
New York, Feb. 12—Lincoln's birth-
day was observed here today by clos-
ing the New York Stock Exchange,
the Consolidated Stock Exchange, the
Produce Exchange and the Cotton
Exchange. Most of the banks in the
city were also closed as the day is a
legal holiday.

**DOES POLITICAL
TRUCE INCLUDE
THE SENATE?**

Ottawa, Feb. 11—The senate today
rejected a motion, for a week's ad-
journment.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed, government
leader, said that under the circum-
stances which existed the government
felt that if the senate adjourned it
should be subject to immediate re-
call by telegram, in case of emer-
gency.

Several senators expressed the op-
inion that if there was likelihood of
emergency business arising, it would
be better the senate should not ad-
journ, and the motion was defeated
by twenty to eleven.

Senator Cloran gave notice that he
intended to inquire 'if it is the in-
tention of the government to apply
to representation in the senate the
policy or plan that now obtains, by
mutual agreement or tacit under-
standing between the two parties in
the house of commons regarding its
representation, the policy or plan to
continue during the course of the war
namely, that Conservative constitu-
encies rendered vacant shall return
to the house of commons supporters
of the present Conservative govern-
ment, and that Liberal constituencies
rendered vacant shall return support-
ers of the Liberal opposition, with-
out recourse to election contests."

The senate adjourned until Tuesday
evening next at eight o'clock.

**Four Dentists
In Bloody Scrap**

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 12.—Locked in
a room on the sixth floor of a down-
town hotel here last night, four men
fought with knives, dentists' instru-
ments and revolvers, until all were
too badly wounded to continue. The
fight was the sequel to business differ-
ences between dentists. When the
police and hotel guests broke into the
room they found Dr. A. F. Johnson, a
local dentist, unconscious, with two
bullet wounds in the groin, Dr. Charles
Kennerly, of San Antonio, Texas, with
blood pouring from a knife wound in
his arm, another man who had regis-
tered as W. E. Arnold, of Mobile, Ala.,
unconscious on the bed with his throat
cut, and Charles Lody, an assistant to
Dr. Johnson, cut and bruised.

**GREEK CONSULS
SENT FROM MONASTIR**

Athens, Greece, Feb. 11 (via Paris,
Feb. 12).—The Patris states that the
Germans and Bulgarians have sent
away the Roumanian and Greek con-
suls at Monastir, in southwestern Ser-
bia, near the Greek frontier.

"This is an event of great impor-
tance," the Patris continued. "It re-
quires more than a protest. The
Skouloudis party pretend that the mea-
sure is a general one, directed against
all neutral consuls, but there are no
other neutral consuls at Monastir.
Further, this city has not the same
interest for Roumania as for us."

RAILWAYS TRACKS
ARE BURIED IN SNOW

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 12.—M. H.
MacLeod, General Manager of the C.
N. R., arrived via the C. P. R. after two
weeks snow-bound in the mountains,
and states that two or three miles of
track are still buried five to thirty
feet deep.

WELL APPOINTED STABLE.

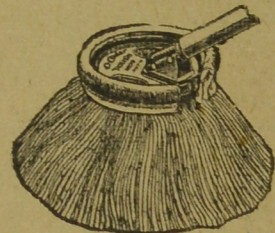
