## ST. JOHN MARINE WHARF TOPIC FOR DISCUSSION

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—The commonsense department estimates. Hon. Charles Maclellan asked Hon. J. M. Hazen if, in view of the threats of renewed German activities on the water, more protection was being provided for shipping on the Gulf and Lower St. Lawrence.

Mr. Hazen replied that he would rather give that privately.

The minister told of progress that is being made on the St. Lawrence ship channel, which will eventually be widened to one thousand feet, with a depth of thirty-five feet at extreme low tide between Montreal and Quebec. He said that this would take four or five years yet to finish and would probably cost eight million or nine million dollars. A little over two million dollars is provided in the present estimates.

Mr. Hazen told Mr. Maclellan that the Canadian lighthouses were rapidly being modernized. He considered our lighting system superior to the American, although the lighthouse buildings, as a whole, were not as good. He also informed Mr. Maclellan that twelve powerful lights had been installed on the Hudson Bay route. These were considered sufficient for the present.

Hon. G. P. Graham questioned the minister in regard to the report of Engineer Anderson of the Hydrographic Survey, relating to the navigability of the Hudson Straits. He remarked that deductions had been drawn by the press that the marine department was not very much in favor of the Hudson Bay scheme.

Mr. Hazen said that he would prefer to have this matter discussed on the naval service estimates, as it more properly came under that head. F. B. Carvell criticized the department in connection with the construction of a marine wharf at St. John, costing \$200,000. He described it as a piece of political jobbery. Mr. Carvell said that he had visited the wharf recently and found cracks on the concrete almost wide enough to drop a hay wire through. It would be impossible, he said, in the present condition of the wharf, to moor a vessel to it.

"What wharf is this?" asked Hon. Robert Rogers, who had just entered the house.

"It is not the big wharf that my honorable friend, the minister of public works, is responsible for. I shall have something to say about that later on. My honorable friend has spent one and a half million dollars on a wharf which is falling to pieces, and he is endeavoring to tie it up with hay wire," added Mr. Carvell.

Reverting to the marine wharf, Mr. Carvell said that the engineers had shown some sense in placing the buildings on the shore. They probably know that some day the wharf would drift out to sea. He said that the trouble was due to the fact that the boulders had not been removed. The concrete had been placed on cribwork with a result that the boulders split the walls. Mr. Carvell also criticized the site of the wharf. It had been placed on the St. John River at the narrow gorge, whereas it should have been located in the harbor.

### HAZEN OFFERS TO BET.

Mr. Hazen, in reply, said that the

allegations of the member for Carleton were far from the facts. The site of the wharf had been purchased by the government at a moderate price. It had been planned by Colonel Anderson, the chief engineer of the marine department, and his assistant, Basil Fraser. These engineers, he said, were quite prepared to justify everything that had been done, and as for himself, he would welcome a fully inquiry into the whole business.

The wharf, he said, if he could rely on the opinion of his engineers, was a solid structure, and there was no possibility of its drifting out to sea. It was already being used by government vessels. Referring to the statement by Mr. Carvell that buildings had not been placed on the wharf, Mr. Hazen said this was due to the necessity of reserving all the space on the wharf for large buoys and other supplies of the marine department.

Mr. Carvell declared that within two years the minister would either have to tear down the wharf or rebuild it, or else build a new wharf around it.

Mr. Hazen—Will the hon. gentleman make a little sporting bet on it?

Mr. Carvell—Yet.

Mr. Hazen said that he would give \$300 or \$1,000 to any charity that might be named, if the wharf did not stand for that time. If it did not stand he wanted Mr. Carvell to pay a similar amount to charity.

Mr. Carvell—I am afraid he would let it stand up a little longer than it was safe in order to make me pay my \$1,000.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that it was commonly reported that Mr. Boone was only the nominal contractor and that the men really interested in the contract were political friends of the minister. Mr. Pugsley doubted if Mr. Boone were a wharf builder at all.

The minister replied that he knew that he had built wharves and that he had been on the ground all the time while his work was in progress.

Mr. Pugsley demanded all the papers in connection with the matter before the item was allowed to pass, and the matter was left in this way.

## CONNECT CANADIAN AND COAST PLOTS

(New York Herald.)

Evidence tending to connect the reported movement to invade Canada at some point near Buffalo with the operations of German propagandists on the Pacific coast, which resulted in the indictment of German consular officials and their agents in San Francisco on Tuesday, was gathered by Dominion Secret Service agents in this city yesterday.

According to that information, many of the German military officers who arrived in this country from neutral ports, presumably to assist in spreading the German propaganda, are now on the Pacific coast, and it is believed that they may have assisted in forwarding the incendiary designs against railroad properties in British Columbia, involving the destruction of bridges and tunnels, with which some of the German consular officials are accused by the Federal Grand Jury in San Francisco.

Secret service men who are investigating the operations of German propagandists here admitted yesterday that they were convinced many of the rifles known to have been purchased here presumably for use in a raid upon Canada have been sent to the Pacific coast, and federal agents there have been ordered to locate the stores at any cost.

Mr. W. H. Sharp, who resigned his seat in the House of Commons in a fruitless effort to help save the Roblin outfit in Manitoba, has been rewarded with a seat in the Senate.

## VON PAPEN HAD DEALINGS WITH C.P.R. BRIDGE DYNAMITER

New York, Feb. 12.—In view of the fact that the Department of Justice by subpoena has required officers of the Riggs National Bank of Washington to produce for the use of the government all records of the financial transactions conducted through that bank by Captain Franz Von Papen, the recalled and discredited German military attaché, reproductions of checks are of exceptional value.

Photographs of the checks are now in the hands of Frank L. Rolk, Counselor to the State Department, having been handed to the American ambassador by the British authorities, who, after granting a safe conduct to Capt. Von Papen, discovered when they searched him at Falmouth that he had agreed to act as a sort of mail carrier for persons engaged in pro-German activities in the United States.

Thereupon they took from him all his papers and checks and stubs and were surprised at the temerity of the German officer in trying to get through the British blockade with checks showing that he had paid \$700 to Werner Horn, accused of attempting to blow up a bridge of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Vanceboro, Me., and \$1,800 to the German consulate in Seattle, Wash., where the surreptitious warfare of Germans in the United States has been extremely active.

Coincident with the dates of those checks it is significant that three days before Capt. Von Papen gave Horn his check the German Embassy deposited in the Riggs National Bank \$2,000.

Count Von Bernstorff, when informed on January 14 that Captain Von Papen had paid money to Horn and to other plotters, made merely this comment:

"I don't believe it." In Washington, it is generally the opinion that Count Von Bernstorff may perhaps be able to get a close view of the checks held by the State Department.

Not only was money generously given to Capt. Von Papen for his "military affairs," but it was paid out with such rapidity by him that time and again the Embassy had to be called upon to replenish the depleted bank account. Persons even in Germany are surprised that an army of less than \$1,000 a year should have handled in about three months \$16,114.62.

One of Captain Von Papen's acolytes was Paul Koenig, who with others has been indicted on the charge of attempting to blow up the Welland Canal. Koenig got something like \$2,000 from Captain Von Papen and the payments were made in comparatively large amounts, one check being for \$1,000 and another for \$500.

In all the checks and stubs taken from Captain Von Papen show about 500 items. In some of the deposits to his credit made by Count Von Bernstorff or in the name of the German Embassy, the excuse for the money is "war intelligence office." In October, 1914, one of the payments on that ac-
