

New Gov. General Sworn in With Imposing Ceremony



Halifax, Nov. 12.—His Grace the Duke of Devonshire was formally installed as Governor General of Canada in the historic council chamber of the Nova Scotia provincial building here at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, in the presence of representatives of the Dominion Government, the Cabinet, the Senate, the navy, the army, the Supreme Court of Canada, the Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, the provincial cabinet, the clergy of Nova Scotia and prominent citizens. His Excellency was sworn in by the Hon. Sir Louis Davies, K. C. M. G. The Duke of Devonshire

was the third Governor General installed at Halifax, the others being the Marquis of Lorne and Earl Grey. The ship bearing the Duke of Devonshire, the Duchess of Devonshire, their two daughters, Lady Maud Louisa Emma Cavendish and Lady Blanche Katherine Cavendish, arrived here at noon. Arrive at Noon.

The big gun on Citadel Hill had just boomed the noon hour when the ship bearing the ducal party swung in along-

side the pier. The gang plank was swung out and the under secretary of state, Mr. Mulvey, went on board and paid his respects to the ducal party. As soon as the ship docked His Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Her Grace the Duchess of Devonshire, Lady Maud Louisa Emma Cavendish and the Lady Blanche Katherine Cavendish, were soon close to the rail of the upper promenade. His Grace wore a morning suit, Her Grace, Lady Maud and Lady Blanche, wore traveling costumes and their furs. The sun shone brightly and there was a nip of cold in the air, a typical fall morning in Canada.

In spite of the rough trip all had an excellent color and were taking a keen interest in everything around. A western battalion was drilling near by—"shun," "form fours"—and the ducal party seemed much interested in the manoeuvres. They remained on board for luncheon.

Shortly before 2 o'clock the Hon. Mr. Blondin, Secretary of State, and staff went on board to receive His Grace and party. In a few minutes they disembarked and were followed shortly by His Grace and Her Grace and suite.

First Touch of Canada.

His Grace was preceded by the equerry in the handsome uniform of an officer of the Coldstream Guards. He wore a morning suit and was followed by Her Grace, who wore a black sealskin coat trimmed with ermine, Lady Maud Louisa Emma Cavendish, who wore a suit of cerise trimmed with fur, Lady Blanche Katherine Cavendish, attired in a suit of blue trimmed with fur, and Colonel Henderson, military secretary.

The oath of office was administered by Sir Louis Davies in the Council Chamber, in the presence of a distinguished gathering. Hon. P. E. Blondin was the only cabinet minister present. After the ceremony the Governor General and party left for Ottawa.

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MILLTOWN HIGH BEATEN BY LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL 6 TO 3

Border Team Although New to English Rugby Put up First Class Game—Fredericton High Won Only in Overtime—Score Was Penalty-Goal and Try to Penalty-Goal.

Milltown High School made its first attempt at the English Rugby game here on Saturday and the attempt was a first class one, as Fredericton won only in overtime. The score was 6 to 3—a penalty goal and a try to a try. The Milltown team played nothing but American football except within the last two or three weeks, and was acquainted with hardly more than the rudiments of the English game. It is the intention of the school to apply for admission to the Interscholastic Rugby League next year. With a little coaching Milltown High will give any team of the league a hard run. The visit of Milltown High was unexpected, and Fredericton High was minus the services of two of its players. McElvaney and Allen were used, and the team was perhaps as good as it usually is.

The Milltown team had the advantage in weight, but lack of acquaintance with the rules handicapped them. For interference they were penalized several times, and also had trouble in understanding the offside rules. In the first half Milltown did very little kicking, although there were several strong punters in the back division. In the second half they did more kicking and made big gains. Their acquaintance with the American game made them stick to individual runs instead of passing, but as the game went on they improved in this department. McLean got away on one long run which looked good for a try, but Howie tackled and downed him a few feet short of the line.

Fredericton High showed better form than it has in the past few games. The scrumming heeled better and the halves did some good passing. Individually, Howie's long runs and tackling and Lounsbury's kicking were features.

The First Half. Twenty minute periods were played. Early in the game it became apparent that the local team would have no walk over, in spite of the fact that Milltown was new to the game. Interference gave several penalties against Mill-

town. On one of these inside the "twenty-five," Lounsbury dropped the ball over. During this period Milltown was on the defensive almost the whole time.

The Second Half.

In the second period Milltown did more kicking and passing and gave Fredericton some anxious moments. Only Howie's hard tackle saved a try on one occasion. The Fredericton quarters were penalized heavily for picking out of the "scrum." One free kick was given about thirty-five yards out. Lawson took the kick and dropped the ball over, tying the score.


There was no further scoring before time was called.

Overtime.

It was decided to play two overtime periods of five minutes each. The first passed without any scoring, although Fredericton had the better of the territory. In the second Fredericton kept up the attack, but the Milltown backs were tackling hard and putting up a stonewall defence. Howie finally ran around the right end of the Milltown half line and scored a try in the corner of the field. The angle was a difficult one and the attempt to convert failed.




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
