Mural Decorations In C.P.R. Station At Vancouver

The walls of the noble and spac-
ious waiting hall of the C. P. R. sta-
tion at Vancouver have recently been
beautified by a series of mural de-
corations representing the principal
mountains seen from the line be-
tween Calgary and the coast. They
are the work of Mrs. Adelaide Lang-
ford, whose training has well qual-
ified her for this species of work,
which is in a class by itself. Mrs.
Langford studied in the Slade School
of London, England, one of the most
celebrated institutions for artistic
training, and she also is a graduate
of the Art Institute of Chicago.

Among her teachers in former years
were Professor Tonks, whose name
is well known in art circles; Prof.
Freer, whose abilities as a water-
colorist are known in two hemis-
pheres, and Mr. H. Vanderpoel, whose
book on the "Human Figure" is one
of the best ever published on figure-
drawing. Mrs. Langford was also a
member of the international jury on
the art works at the St. Louis Exposi-
tion, and holds several medals.

It is perhaps to be regretted that
architectural exigencies led to the
placing of the panels to be decorated
so high that they are liable to escape
the notice of the ordinary observer,
though this is but following the ex-
ample of many edifices of the kind,
both on this continent and in Europe.
Still to people of average powers of
vision, this series of the mural de-
corations need present no difficulty.
They will find that the laws of mural
decoration have been adhered to.
The general tone of the interior they
ornament has been borne in mind by
the artist, who has subdued her col-
ors so that they harmonize with and
seem part and parcel of their sur-
roundings. They are broadly and
simply executed, and will bear exami-
nation by the aid of a field glass, so
as to bring them within the range of
the convention which decrees that
the proper distance at which to look
at a picture is three times its great-
est dimension.

Following the frieze around from
the northwest corner, westward, the
following list will help to make the
series more intelligible. The first
picture is:

**Mount Stephen and Kicking Horse
River,** as seen from Field. This is
the gateway to the famous Yoho val-
ley, and a favorite stopping place for
tourists. The winding waters of the
river are particularly well shown.

Lake Louise, Laggan, as seen from
the chateau. Those who have visited
this place do not forget its quiet
peace and grandeur. Here we get
sight of the splendid glacier, which,
as it thaws, produces the beautiful
green water of river and lake.

The Falls at Banff are depicted
with much vigor of handling, and the
mountain background melting into
the distance is excellently treated.

Mount Temple, as seen from the
main line of the C. P. R., near Lake

Louise, is an arresting object in the
landscape, but this decoration is
scarcely so arresting as the one
which follows, viz.:

Banff, as seen by the light of even-
ing. There is much rich color in this
picture, which also shows the reflec-
tion of Mount Rundle and the giant
pines that tower aloft. The river
shown runs between Rundle and
Tunnel mountain.

**Mount Agnes and the Lake in the
Clouds.** This spot is reached by
bridle trail from the Chateau Louise,
and the lake nestling among the
peaks is an interesting object.

The Creek leading to Lake Moraine,
in the Valley of the Ten Peaks. In
the distance may be seen part of the
glacier from the wonderful stretch
of the ice-fields of the Rockies.

The Beehive. The queer formation
of this mountain has been well set
forth by the artist in this decoration.
It is shown as seen from the trail
from Laggan. In the distance is the
Valley of the Ten Peaks.

The Gap. The traveller who is
familiar with the C. P. R. line will
remember this spot, where after tra-
velling some miles side by side with
Bow river he enters the noble region
of mountain where sublimity reigns.

The Three Sisters forms the first
important group meeting the eye of
the traveller from the plains, and
they never fail to arouse the enthusi-
asm of the lover of natural beauty
and grandeur.

Mount Wapta. This decoration is
one of the best of the series, the com-
position of the picture being espe-
cially admirable. Mount Wapta is one
of the finest peaks in the Rockies.
This view also gives a glimpse of
Summit Lake.

Castle Mountain. The peculiar
formation of this mountain is well
shown. Its series of what are ap-
parently round towers, its pinnacles
and "donjon keeps" give appropri-
ness to its name.

The Crow's Nest. Here likewise
we see the appropriateness of a
name. This is almost the chief
mountain on the Crow's Nest branch
of the C. P. R.

The Lions, as seen from the golf
links, Vancouver.

Cathedral Mountain. One of the
most beautiful of the whole range of
our Western Switzerland. Its snow-
recesses look as if they might be the
home of roaming polar bears.

Mount Regis, as seen from the main
line.

Additional interest is given to the
Langford's work from the fact that
she has been a hard working organ-
izer in the way of art. She was the
manager of the artistic education
work of the normal and model
schools of the Mount's a Commem-
orial at Windsor. And it was she who
with others helped in the starting of
the Vancouver Studio Club, out of
which grew the B. C. Society of Fine
Arts.

Opposition Platform

The following platform was adopted at the Opposition Con-
vention held in St. John recently:
In the event of the Opposition being returned to power, we pledge
ourselves:—

NO PARTIZAN CONTROL OF CROWN LANDS.

1. We pledge ourselves to completely reorganize the Crown-
Lands Department, so that its administration shall be entirely
severed from politics and administered on sound business prin-
ciples under systematic plans by a non-partizan commission speci-
ally appointed for that purpose, responsible to the Legislature and
working in co-operation with the Dominion Commission of Con-
servation.

TAKE THE HIGHWAYS OUT OF POLITICS.

2. We pledge ourselves to take the highways out of politics,
giving the expenditure of the money collected from the people and
the control of the labor, together with the Government appropria-
tions, into the hands of supervisors, chosen by the people of each
parish, to whom a detailed and audited account must be rendered
every year at the annual meeting, and a duplicate thereof for-
warded to the Department of Public Works, the work of the super-
visors to be under the inspection of a competent provincial en-
gineer.

We also pledge ourselves to set aside the money collected
from the licenses upon automobiles and other motor vehicles, to-
gether with an equal appropriation from the revenues of the Pro-
vince each year, to pay the interest upon the bonds to provide for
permanent roads, which shall be constructed as rapidly as possible.

PROHIBITION PROVINCE WIDE.

3. We pledge ourselves at the first session of the Legislature
to pass a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within
the Province to the fullest extent allowed by the Constitution, and
within three months after the passage of said Act to submit the
same by referendum to the electors of the Province, and should
the majority of votes cast be in favor of the said law, then to
bring the same into force by proclamation within one year there-
after.

ELECTION LAW.

4. (a) To amend the electoral law so as to make it impos-
sible for members of the Legislature to traffic with the Government and
still retain their seats.

(b) To make it possible for young men, when they reach the
age of 21 years, to register their names and be placed forthwith
upon the voters' lists, instead of waiting for the tedious machinery
of revision as it now exists.

(c) To divide the counties into electoral districts which shall
each be represented by one member.

We also consider amendments to the election law to
prevent bribery in municipal as well as provincial elections impos-
sible.

PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

5. To obtain at once a correct statement of the financial con-
dition of the Province in order that the people may have definite
knowledge of the vastly increased public debt and the enormous
obligations of guaranteed bonds they will be called upon to pay;
and to so reduce the cost of the administration of affairs and the
number of useless officials as to avoid the necessity for direct tax-
ation now confronting us.

AGRICULTURE.

6. To give the farmers all the practical assistance that the
resources of the Province will permit, to improve agricultural
methods and the quality and quantity of the stock upon the farm;
to reduce the enormous salary list in the department, and to spend
the educational grant received from the Federal Government
without regard for political patronage.

VALLEY RAILWAY.

7. To complete the Valley Railway from a point on the Trans-
continental Railway at or near Grand Falls, to St. John, and insist
upon the Dominion Government carrying out the terms of the
original legislation and allow the Province forty per cent. of the
gross earnings thereof.

EDUCATION.

8. To always maintain and improve the educational service
of the Province and to co-operate with the Federal Government in
carrying out the recommendations of the commission upon tech-
nical education.

IMMIGRATION.

9. The inauguration of a vigorous immigration policy to
properly place before intending immigrants, whose number will
be large after termination of the war, the advantages of the agri-
cultural possibilities of New Brunswick.
