

Sunbury County Opposition Names a Winning Team

Coun. David W. Mersereau of Gladstone and Mr. R. B. Smith of Oromocto Chosen at Large and Enthusiastic Convention Held at Burton Court House--County Opposition Association Formed--Ringing Speeches by Mr. W. E. Foster, Mr. E. S. Carter and Others.

Burton, N. B., July 19.—Sunbury County opposition electors would not be denied today. They held a convention at Burton, the shiretown of the county, in their historic court house, and in spite of his doctor's orders and the natural reluctance of an obedient patient to disobey the instructions of his physician, they selected Robert B. Smith, of Oromocto, as one of the Opposition candidates to contest the county when the general elections are announced. In doing so they paid a great compliment to Mr. Smith and one that he and his friends must recognize and be proud of. He has been in ill health for some time, but at a conference of Opposition county leaders at Oromocto two or three weeks ago, he consented to lead the Opposition ticket in the county, if his health permitted. Today the electors are willing to take him at his word, and they showed it by nominating him. If, as they said, "this government holds on to the last gasp," Mr. Smith may be as healthy as any of them by that time.

So the ticket nominated today was Robert B. Smith, of Oromocto, and Councillor David W. Mersereau, of Fredericton Junction. Both of these gentlemen are well known in the county, where Mr. Smith has large business interests, and Mr. Mersereau, through his railway and other connections, a wide and popular acquaintance.

Convention was Representative.

The convention was a very representative one and included representation from every parish in the county with the exception of Northfield. The delegation from that parish intended

to make the long journey by driving over the county highways, but if the roads between the shiretown and Northfield compare in any degree with those in other parts of the country, the reason for their non-arrival is fully explained.

As it was, H. H. Smith was elected from Blissville; Capt. Ferris, Robert McSheffrey and Trimple McSheffrey from Lincoln; David Wood, William Jones, Moses Smith and Charles Gilmore from Burton; Perley Duplissea, Luke M. Gallagher, John Sanderson, from Gladstone; David W. Seeley and Geo. W. Foster from Maugerville; and J. R. Randall and C. S. Burpee from Sheffield.

These delegates formed a nominating committee of the convention, and after considerable deliberation their chairman, H. H. Smith, reported to the convention that Robert B. Smith and David W. Mersereau had been selected. The convenor Milton A. Smith put the question of adoption to the convention at large and the vote was unanimous. In addition to the speech of acceptance by Mr. Mersereau, W. E. Foster, of St. John, chairman of the leadership committee, and provincial organizer E. S. Carter, delivered addresses that were listened to with great attention and applause.

The Speeches.

The principal part of Mr. Foster's speech was devoted to an explanation of the crown land policy of the opposition, and Mr. Carter, after touching upon matters of organization, dwelt for some time upon the road policy as outlined at the Opposition convention in January last at St. John.

Mr. Mersereau's speech was brief

but it showed that he would be quite able to take his part upon any platform and to deal with the issues of the day in a clear and eloquent fashion. He paid his respects to the St. John Standard, which apparently already has been giving him some attention, and commenting upon the Standard's statement that he had too much to say, said that it could be easily understood why the Standard preferred that opposition men should remain mute.

Mr. Mersereau got a great reception from the convention and his speech was warmly applauded.

Mr. W. E. Foster, of St. John, chairman of the Opposition committee on leadership, spoke next, dealing ably with the crown land problem and defining the Opposition policy in connection therewith.

Mr. E. S. Carter, Opposition organizer, followed, explaining at some length the road policy of the Opposition.

Opposition Association Formed.

A county Opposition Association was formed, with Arnauld Miles president, F. W. Barker, vice-president, and David M. Seeley secretary-treasurer.

Robert B. Smith, one of the candidates nominated, was unable to be present at the meeting, but sent a letter to the organizer in which he said: "You and our party can certainly depend on me to do anything in my power to help elect any candidate whom your committee may see fit to nominate, and I sincerely hope you may succeed in choosing two good men who will successfully carry our standard to victory."

The electors of Sunbury believe that Mr. Smith will be a good standard bearer.

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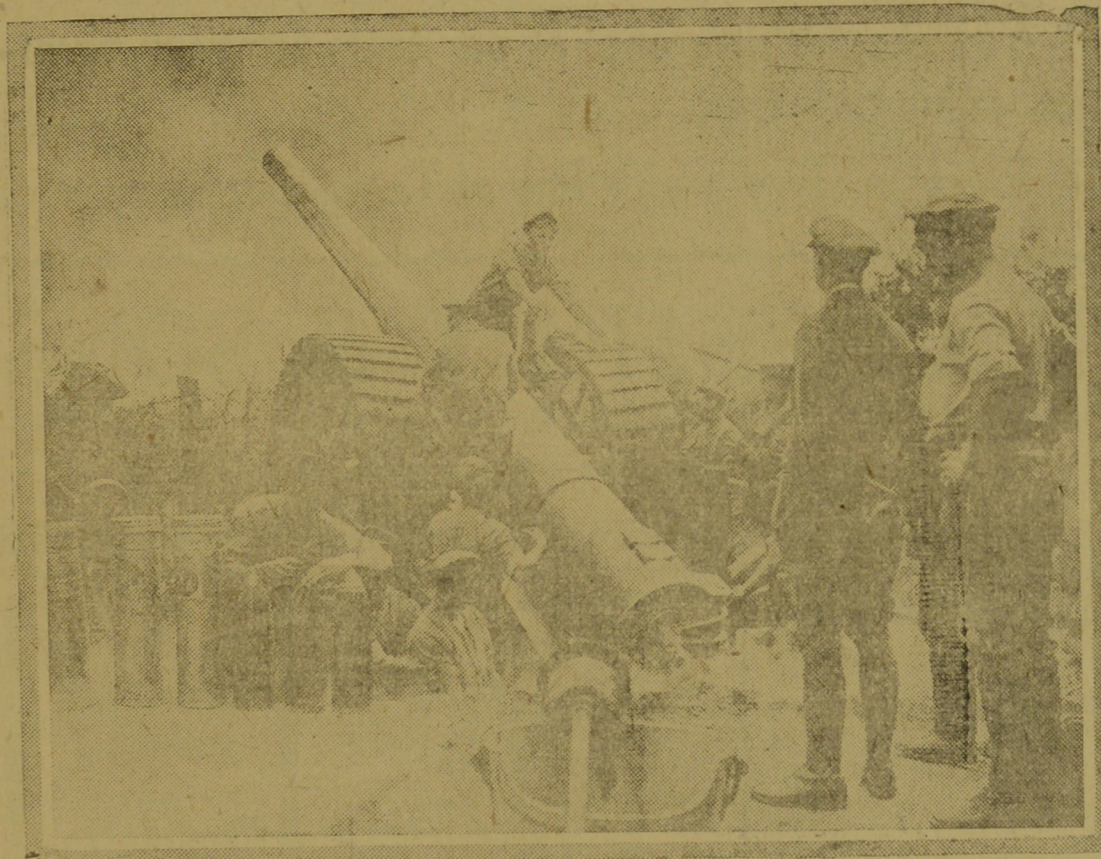
