THE DEUTSCHLAND'S EXPLOIT.

There is at least one resident of this continent who is not very seriously impressed with the voyage of the German super-submarine. His name is Henry Gourdeau, and he writes as follows to the New York World.

"For spectacular exploits the Teuton is peculiar, and here comes the latest one, the crossing of the Atlantic by a submarine. Why journalists should be dazzled by pyrotechnics I cannot understand, unless I consider Dana's axiom that it is the unusual that is news.

"One solitary German raider broke the blockade, and with the seven seas to work in, she accomplished less than the least of the Confederate raiders. What have the submarines or the famed Zeppelins accomplished to offset the harm they inflicted on Germany?

"But why the fuss over a boat more than 300 feet long, equipped with modern engines, built of steel and well manned, crossing the narrowest of the oceans? The Vikings crossed in open boats, a half-score of American yachtsmen have crossed in motor-boats. Sir Thomas Lipton's yachts have crossed under sail, and fishermen cross the Atlantic in fifty-ton boats.

"The Pilgrims crossed in an old tub, and Drake sailed around the world in an old hulk, and they had no modern equipment on board. And the greatest of all voyages was performed by Captain Slocum, of Boston, an aged seaman, who sailed completely around the world alone in a sailboat he rebuilt himself.

"If the British authorities had as much brains as I believe they have common sense, they would send a submarine around the world by the all-red route."

The writer of the above has presented quite a catalogue of marine exploits and may therefore be pardoned for his neglect to give incidental honor to Noah, whose name is still associated with the most impressive and important sea voyage in history.

RUBBISH HEAPS.

More fires originate in rubbish heaps than from any other source. FRENCH BATTALION HAS BEEN DISBANDED

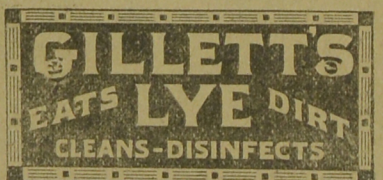
