## U. S. PROHIBITIONISTS TO NAME CANDIDATE

St. Paul, Minn., July 19.—Confident that the ticket they nominate will poll the largest vote in the history of the party, the delegates to the prohibition party opened the twelfth quirennial convention today in the Auditorium Hall.

The willingness of such men as William Sulzer of New York, J. Frank Hanley, of Indiana, Eugene N. Foss, of Massachusetts, and Sumner W. Haines, of Portland, Ind., to be considered as presidential candidates, indicates the leaders says, a widening of the party influence and they expect thousands of former progressives to vote with them.

Some party leaders express the belief that the contest has narrowed down to two men, Sulzer and Hanly.

## WARSHIPS LAYING FOR THE DEUTSCHLAND

Norfolk, Va., July 20.—Foreign war ships which have been waiting off the Virginia Capes for the Deutschland, were obliged to go out far to sea today when a northeast gale made it dangerous for them to lay too close to the shore.

High seas and a 60-mile gale at Cape Henry drove the foreign ships to seek safety in deep water, probably ten miles off shore.

## 200 FISHERMAN MAY HAVE BEEN LOST

London, July 20.—Two hundred fishermen are believed to have lost their lives in a monsoon off the coast of Colombo, Ceylon, according to a despatch received by the Exchange Telegraph Company.

A large fishing fleet was caught by the storm and more than one hundred boats have failed to return.

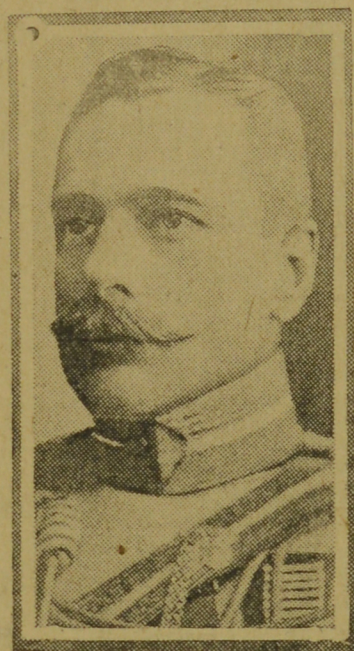
## REPORT TO BE PRESENTED TOMORROW

Ottawa, July 20.—The finding of the Meredith-Duff Royal Commission inquiring into the fuse charges made in the House of Commons by G. W. Kyte, member for Richmond, N.S., will be in the hands of the government some time today or tomorrow. It was signed by the commissioners this morning and was at once sent to the King's printer to be bound into book form. With the finding in its possession, the government will decide upon a date for publication, which, it is believed, will not be long delayed.

## Heavy Fighting On Somme Front

London, July 20.—Heavy fighting continues on the Somme front, the War Office announced today. The British have gained ground in the Deville wood and at Longueval.

North of the Longueval-Basentin position the British pushed forward their line.

## A German Mine Layer Captured

London, July 20.—The first official announcement that Great Britain had captured a German mine-laying submarine of the U-35 class, was made in the House of Commons today by Thos. J. MacNamara, financial secretary of the Admiralty, who said that one of these vessels would be brought to London to be viewed by the public.

## RUSSIANS REPULSE TEUTONIC FORCES

Petrograd, via London, July 20.—Attempts by Teutonic forces to advance against the Russians in the region of the River Stokhod, in Volhynia, have been repulsed, the War Office announced today.

Operations in Galicia are being notably affected by the overflowing of the river Dniester, which is flooding large areas.

## EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA IS SERIOUSLY ILL

New York, July 20.—A London cable to the Journal today says:

An Exchange Telegraph Company despatch from Geneva reiterates the report recently sent out from Rome that Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria is gravely ill and that the Imperial family has been summoned to his bedside at Schoenbrunn Castle.

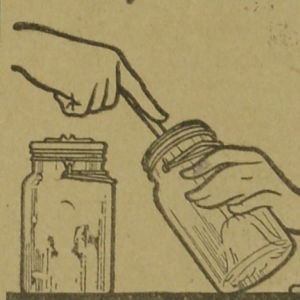
