She was well known in Fredericton, having conducted a grocery store on the corner Charlotte and York sts for many years. The funeral took place this afternoon, Rev. Mr. Boothroyd conducting the service. Interment was made at Lincoln.

Drowned at Kilburn.

Charles Etherbridge, a student, belonging to Brooklyn, N. Y., was drowned while bathing in the St. John river at Kilburn yesterday. He was making a canoe trip from Grand Falls to Fredericton with a party of friends, among whom was Mr. C. H. Lee, of St. John. The young man dove from a scow, and it is supposed struck the water in such a way as to cause him to lose his breath. He sank before help could reach him.

Died Yesterday.

Mrs. Elizabeth Beckwith, widow of the late Harry Beckwith, ex-Mayor of Fredericton, passed away in Canticook, N. H., yesterday. She was aged seventy-two years and is survived by two daughters, Mrs. A. M. Gibson, of Fredericton, and Mrs. F. A. Griffiths, of Canticook. Mrs. Gibson left for Boston on Tuesday. The remains will be brought to Fredericton for interment Friday afternoon. The funeral will take place at 2.30 from the residence of Mr. A. M. Gibson, Waterloo Row. Interment will be made at Forest Hill.

Harvey Strickland Dead.

Mr. Harvey Strickland, a former resident of this city, died at the Provincial Hospital at Fairville yesterday aged seventy-two years. Mr. Strickland had been an inmate of the institution for over twenty years. His insanity was of a harmless type and he was allowed a great deal of liberty. He was an expert horseman and acted as coachman for the superintendent. He was permitted to visit Fredericton on several occasions, and while here called upon old friends, usually presenting them with a check for a liberal amount on some bank where he claimed to have a healthy account. On one occasion a candidate for parliamentary honors in York received a letter from him containing a check for \$10,000.

HERE AFTER RECRUITS

Lieut. H. A. Bridges of St. John Wants Men--Two More Enlist Here For the 236th Highlanders Battalion.

The 9th Siege Battery, which is mobilizing at St. John, is seeking recruits. Lieut. H. A. Bridges, an undergraduate at the University of New Brunswick, and a son of Dr. H. S. Bridges, of St. John, arrived here last night and today is after recruits for the battery.

He is spending part of his time at St. Anthony's picnic at St. Marys, in an attempt to get recruits.

Men from the 236th Highlanders also are there after recruits.

The 9th Siege Battery is to be armed with eight-inch howitzers, one of the latest of the heavy guns used by the British army. These guns use high-angle fire. The unit so far has proved most popular. It is now at Partridge Island, St. John, but will go to Halifax early in August to complete training.

It is expected that the battery will go overseas soon after that.

Two More Recruits.

The 236th Highlanders secured two more recruits here this morning, Henry Arthur Dickinson, 18, St. John, and Ronald C. Robinson, 18, Fredericton. Private Dickinson will join the pipe band as a drummer.

PROMOTED IN
FIELD TO CAPTAIN

Lieut. Rainsford H. Winslow Gets Step In Rank With 3rd Pioneer Battalion--Lieut. J. A. Winslow to Go to France.

Mr. J. J. F. Winslow has received word to the effect that his brother, Rainsford H. Winslow, has been promoted to the rank of captain in the 3rd Pioneer Battalion, now in France.

Capt. Winslow joined this battalion in the Canadian west and went to England as a lieutenant. He is a graduate of McGill University and some years ago attended the University of New Brunswick.

This pioneer battalion has done excellent work since leaving Canada.

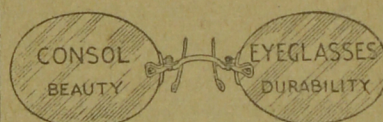
Capt. Winslow's training as an engineer in civilian life fitted him for military life in this battalion.

Word has also been received from Lieut. J. A. Winslow to the effect that he expected to leave for France within a few days after writing the letter. Lieut. Winslow left Fredericton in August, 1914, with the first draft which left Fredericton. At Valcartier he was appointed by Col. H. F. McLeod a lieutenant in the 12th Battalion. After being in England some time he was appointed to an office position at Canadian headquarters in London.

Recently he decided to transfer to the artillery branch of the service, and after taking a course in England was gazetted to the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery.

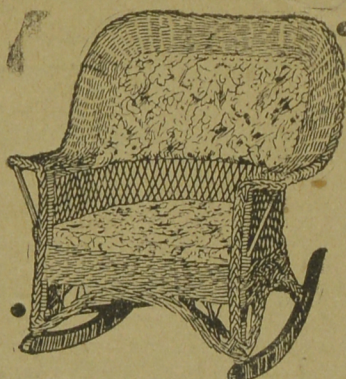

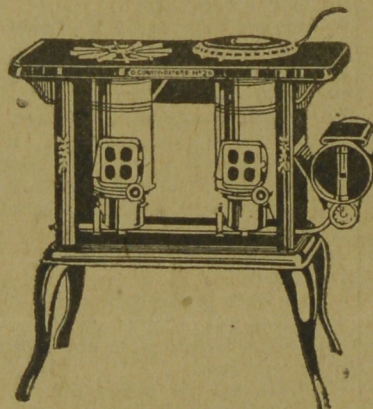
