WOMAN'S COLUMN

Unsweetened Grape Juice.

Men are often fond of unsweetened grape juice. The process of preparing the juice without sugar, so it will keep is easy. If the juice is pure, and is filtered and sterilized, it will not ferment.

Mash fresh grapes, extract the juice, turn it out into an earthen crock and set aside over night. Turn the clear juice into bottles, set the bottles in a boiler, which is filled with cold water up to the necks, place the corks loosely in place, bring the water to the boiling point slowly, and boil thirty minutes. Fill bottles to their rims, from one of the number, and cork while hot.

"Jelly" Grape Juice.

Any grape jelly makes the most delicious and clearest of grape juice. Dilute three or four table-spoons of the jelly in a glass of water.

"Mordkin" Grape Juice.

Equally simple to make and delicious to drink is the product made according to this recipe for "uncooked" grape juice.—

Wash fresh, ripe grapes, press out the juice, strain through a cheese-cloth. Measure the juice and add an equal volume of sugar. Put into jars and heat. Dilute with ice-water before serving. Use the

remainder of the pulp for making jelly.

Bryan Grape Juice.

Heat the thoroughly ripe grapes slowly—in a double boiler or crock on the back of the stove or in a slow oven. When the skins are tender strain through a cheese-cloth bag without squeezing. When juice has been replaced on stove and is at boiling point add half as much sugar as juice. Let dissolve perfectly, seal while hot.

Containers for Grape Juice.

Any glass bottle or can will answer the purpose for putting up grape juice. Fruit jars, especially the pint size, are quite as satisfactory as bottles, and the sealing of cans is much easier than the corking of bottles. Jugs, if small size, are preferred by some housekeepers. Whatever the container it should be sterilized by boiling in a wash boiler for thirty minutes before filling.

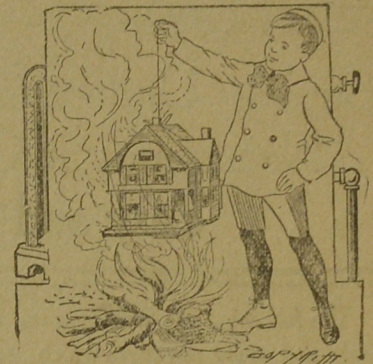
