Partington Sale Confirmed.

Mr. N. M. Jones, manager for the Partington Pulp & Paper Co., has confirmed in Bangor the report that the company's property in New Brunswick had been sold. The purchasers are the Oxford Paper Co., of Rumford, Me., and the Bryant Paper Co., of Kalamazoo, Mich. The new company will be known as the Nashua Pulp & Paper Company. Mr. Jones refused to confirm or deny the report that a pulp mill would be built at Marysville, but the name of the new company seems to indicate that it will.

Successful Sportsmen.

Messrs. John S. Dickerson and J. M. Uppicu, of New York, who have been hunting big game near Doaktown with James Storey as guide, returned to the city by auto yesterday and left for home by the evening train. Each shot a moose with an antler spread of over 50 inches, and Mr. Dickerson also secured a caribou and two buck deer. They returned home well pleased with their outing.

Suit is Begun.

The suit in connection with the right of way of the St. John & Quebec Railway through city land near the corner of Aberdeen and York streets, has been begun. It will be before the Exchequer Court, which will meet here late in October. The parties are the Dominion Government, the City of Fredericton and the Palmer-McLellan Shoeapack Company, the latter holding a portion of the land under lease from the city, which owns the property. The Dominion Government made an offer of \$799 for the property, but the offer was refused. Mr. R. B. Hanson is solicitor for the Government.

THREE FREDERICTON
MEN WOUNDED ON
WESTERN FRONT

Dorian Pond and Frank Barristo Formerly of 71st Reg., Band, Oscar White Who Left With First Draft.

Official telegrams received last evening announced that three more Fredericton men had been wounded in France. Two of the number, Dorian Pond and Frank Barristo, were bandmen, who volunteered for service in the ranks at the front. The other is Oscar White, who also left Fredericton with the first draft from the 71st York Regiment.

Mr. John Barristo received a telegram informing him that his son, Private Frank Barristo, had been admitted to hospital with a gunshot wound in the legs. Private Barristo was an electrician in the employ of the W. Alan Staples Estate, prior to enlisting. He left Fredericton with the 71st York Regiment Band, in September, 1914. The band was allotted to the 12th Battalion. Last spring all but two of the Fredericton men in this band volunteered for service in the ranks in France, and were drafted.

Mrs. Annie Mallett, 245 Charlotte street, received a telegram informing her that her son Private Dorian Pond had been admitted September 25th to No. 2 Australian General Hospital, at Boulogne, suffering from shrapnel wounds in arm and hip. Private Pond also was a member of the 71st Regt. Band and went to France under the same circumstances as Private Frank Barristo.

MR. ABRAM ALWARD
PROVINCIAL LIBRARIAN
DIED SUDDENLY

Well Known and Respected Citizen Fatally Stricken With Apoplexy at His Home This Morning-- Was a Native of Havelock

Mr. Abram Alward, provincial librarian and a well known citizen, died quite unexpectedly this morning at his home on Saunders street, after a very brief illness. The news was a great shock to his numerous friends, and the bereaved family are receiving many expressions of sympathy.

Mr. Alward had not been in the enjoyment of his usual health for several days. Yesterday afternoon about five o'clock he went down town to visit a barber shop and was taken ill. A friend accompanied him home and soon afterwards a physician was called. He found his condition quite serious, but not alarming. However, he became worse during the night and at 7 o'clock this morning breathed his last. Apoplexy was the cause of his death.

The deceased was a native of Havelock, Kings county, and for many years conducted a large farm on the border of Kings and Westmorland counties. He took an active interest in municipal affairs and for several terms represented the Parish of Salisbury in the Westmorland Municipal Council.

He was a most successful dairyman and about twenty years ago was appointed travelling dairy instructor by the provincial government, removing with his family to this city.

Several years later, on the death of the late Mr. H. G. C. Wetmore, he was
