ALLIES ACCUSED OF LAWLESS PRACTICE

Washington, May 26—The United States, denouncing interference with neutral mails, has notified Great Britain and France that it can no longer tolerate the wrongs which American citizens have suffered and continue to suffer through the 'lawless practice' those governments have indulged in, and that only a radical change in policy, restoring the United States to its full rights as a neutral power, will be satisfactory.

This notification is given in the latest American communication to the two governments, the text of which was made public by the state department tonight. The time in which the charge must be effected is not specified, but the United States expects prompt action.

"Onerous and vexatious" abuses which have been perpetrated by the British and French governments in seizing and censoring neutral mails are recited in the communication, and answers are made to the legal arguments contained in the reply of the Entente governments to the first American note on the subject. It is vigorously set forth that not only have American commercial interests been injured, but that the rights of property have been violated, and the rules of international law and custom palpably disregarded. Notice is served that the United States soon will press claims against the British and French governments for the losses which already have been sustained.

MUCH QUIETER ON CANADIAN FRONT

Ottawa, May 26—In contrast to the terrific battle on the French front at Verdun, conditions on the British and Canadian fronts have remained almost normal, according to the weekly communique from the Canadian general representatives at the front, which follows:

General Headquarters of the Canadian Army in France, via London, May 26—During the past week there was considerable artillery activity on the Canadian front. On various occasions sections of our line were heavily bombarded. Retaliation by our mortars and batteries proved effective in checking the enemy's fire, and severely damaged his trenches. Sniping remained normal. Machine gun and rifle fire were brisk on both sides, particularly at night.

Good progress was made in the construction and improvement of our own defensive works. Numerous hostile working parties were dispersed. Our patrols were constantly active and gained much useful information. No enemy patrols were encountered.

Bombs were dropped by German aviators in the vicinity of several of our camps and villages in our area. Their effect was insignificant.

The trial began two weeks ago, and nearly 700 veniremen have been examined in an effort to obtain a jury.

GOOD PLAYING BY SPEAKER AND GRANEY

Chicago, May 27.—Individual playing of two Cleveland stars, Tris Speaker and John Graney, according to averages published here today, including games of last Wednesday, has contributed in no small way to the success of the Indians.

Speaker led the batters of the American League with a percentage of .361 and has scored more runs than any other player in the league, having crossed the plate 25 times.

Graney leads the league in home runs with four, and in total bases with 64.

Washington leads the league in team hitting with 258.

Jake Daubert, of Brooklyn, leads the batters of the National League with .393. New York leads the league in club batting with 269.

GOING OVERSEAS SHORTLY.

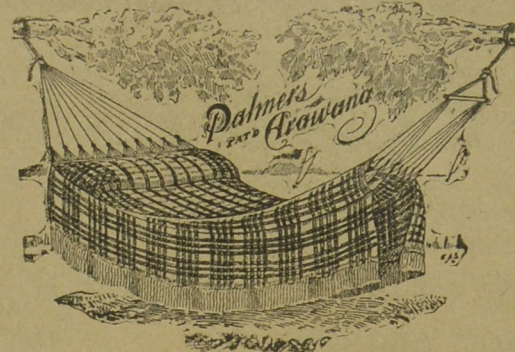

THE WESTMORLAND CAMPAIGN.

The by-election in Westmorland is said to be the liveliest ever held in the province. The Blair affidavit, telling how the big boodle fund was raised in 1912, has created a tremendous sensation in the county and government speakers are making frantic efforts to stem the tide. The Standard today, instead of denying the serious allegations made by Blair, it gives prominence to an announcement that Hon. J. A. Murray will institute proceedings for libel because of a statement to the effect that the McLeod letter was shown to him by Mr. Blair. The affidavit did not state that the letter was shown to Hon. Mr. Murray, but it did state that it was shown to Premier Clarke and the latter admits that he saw it. The government forces are now preparing some kind of a counterblast to offset the damaging effect of the Blair affidavit.

STEAMER HAMPSTEAD.

The steamer Hampstead is to go on the St. John-Fredericton route next week. She is now being overhauled.
