SERGT. JACOB WEASEL
RETURNS AFTER SERVICE
ON WESTERN FRONT

Invalided Home on Account of Injuries
--Was With 10th Battalion--
Major Pringle Sends Interesting Souvenir.

Sergt. Jacob Weasel of this city, returned home this morning after being on service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force for upwards of a year and a half. Sergt. Weasel appears in excellent physical condition. He has been invalided home on account of injuries to his feet and back.

Sergt. Weasel left Fredericton in August, 1914, with the first draft from the 71st York Regt. At Valcartier he joined the 12th Battalion and was appointed farrier sergeant. After the 12th Battalion became a reserve battalion in England, Sergt. Weasel gave up his stripes and went to France as a private. He joined the 10th Battalion and with it saw considerable service. Lt. Col. P. A. Guthrie of this city, was with the 10th Battalion at the time.

Upon being invalided to England, Sergt. Weasel rejoined it with his former rank and remained with it for several months.

Interesting Souvenir.

Mrs. James Pringle of this city, has received an interesting souvenir from her husband, Major James Pringle, quartermaster of the 26th Battalion. It is a brass kettle with copper spout and was found in a ruined house in Belgium. Pressed wild flowers from the same country were also sent by the major.

CONGREGATION WILL
HOLD LAST SERVICE
IN AULD KIRK

Arrangements For Special Music Tomorrow Morning--Members of Former Days Will Take Part.

The last congregational service to be held in the Auld Kirk will take place Sunday morning. Arrangements are being made to have a special service to commemorate the last occasion on which St. Paul's Presbyterian congregation will attend service in the old church edifice. It is probable that St. Paul's Sunday School will meet in the Auld Kirk for several Sundays before its removal to make room for the new building donated to the congregation by the late Donald Fraser.

As many as possible of those who sang in the choir in the Auld Kirk in former years are to be in the choir tomorrow morning. The psalms and hymns have been selected to correspond with the nature of the service. The 100th Psalm, 23rd Psalm and 121st Psalm will be sung in old metre. The hymns will be, O God of Bethel and O God Our Help in Ages Past.

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, pastor of the church, will preach the sermon and arrangements for the special seating of the congregation have been made.

The Auld Kirk was dedicated in 1832, being then situated at the corner of George and York streets. It was a frame structure of wood and was surmounted by belfry and cupola. When the new St. Paul's church was built, the Auld Kirk was removed to its present site in York street. Later, when it was altered, the belfry

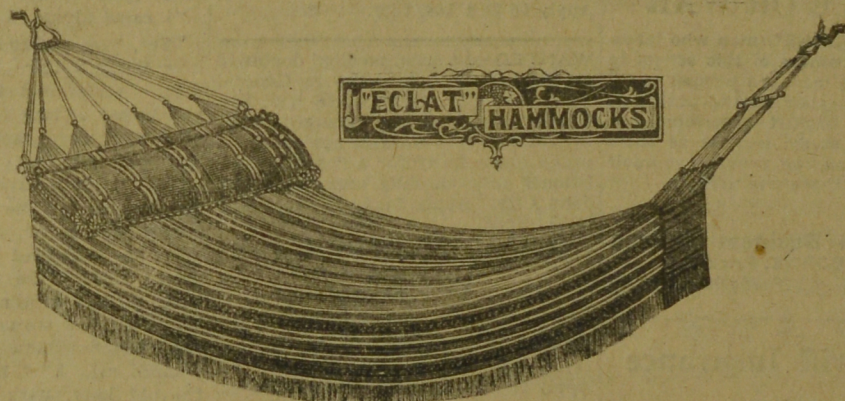
