ROLL OF HONOR OF METHODISTS UNVEILED

The Roll of Honor containing the names of those members of the Fredericton Methodist congregation who have enlisted in the Canadian forces since the outbreak of the war was unveiled with appropriate ceremony at the Methodist church last night. Sixty-one names are on the roll and they will be added to as time goes on.

Hon. Josiah Wood, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, unveiled the roll after Mr. John J. Weddall had read the list of names. The congregation rose and stood while the National Anthem was sung. His Honor gave a brief address, in which he mentioned the demands which King and Country were making upon the people and the feeling of admiration and respect which should be felt for those who had answered the call. The pastor, Rev. Thomas Marshall, then preached a short sermon, in which he made reference to the tablet and those who had gone into the Army.

OVERSEAS OFFICER TO CONTEST N. S. SEAT

London, March 27.—Lieut. A. H. White of Wolfville, N.S., who was for some time at the front, but is temporarily stationed at Shorncliffe, has accepted nomination to stand for King's county, N.S., in the legislative elections and will contest the riding in the Conservative interests. Lieut. Chute has been granted leave to proceed to Canada for the campaign.

SOLDIER MEETS WITH LOSS.

Private John Watson, who has been one of the special guards at the Legislative Buildings, met with a heavy loss Saturday afternoon when his dwelling, situated about three miles from Fredericton Junction, was totally destroyed by fire. Private Watson was informed Saturday night of the fire and left for Fredericton Junction. Private Watson left Fredericton with the first draft from the 1st York Regt. He was wounded in the arm at Festubert. He has a wife and four children and has met with much misfortune this winter, losing a team of horses and also his dwelling. It is probable that the authorities will be asked to take some steps to assist him.

U.N.B. MOCK PARLIAMYT.

The opening of the U.N.B. Mock Parliament took place Saturday night. His Honor C. E. Maimann, Governor General, attended by an imposing military staff, entered the chamber in state and read the Speech from the Throne. Hon. W. Creaghan was Speaker and Hon. J. K. Trevelyan leader of the Opposition. After the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne had been moved and seconded by two members of the House, adjournment was moved by the Premier, Hon. F. C. Cronkhite, leader of the Liberal Socialist party, now in power, and seconded by Hon. John Flood, Minister of Public Works. The session was followed by an informal dance.

PRESENTED INSTRUMENTS.

"I've got some of it, all right," he said, "and Tom Jones is coming along with the rest."

Berlin Admits Loss Of A Trench

Berlin, March 27 (via London).—More than one hundred yards of German trenches near St. Eloi have been blown up by the British. German army headquarters announced today. West Prussian regiments were successful in recapturing the artillery observation positions lost by the Germans on the 20th near Mokrzyce, near the Narocz Lakes, on the Russian front, today's announcement also states.

Wounded Soldiers Reach Halifax

Halifax, March 27.—Nine officers, one warrant officer and ninety-six non-commissioned officers and men, returned wounded or invalided, arrived here today from Liverpool. Among them was Clinton Annand, of Elmsdale, who has been wounded several times. He belonged to a Calgary battalion. The men will be taken to Quebec.

BIG PRIZE MONEY FOR BRITISH TARS

London, March 27.—Sir Samuel Evans president of the prize court, today awarded the officers and crew of the British auxiliary cruiser Carmania £2,115 as prize bounty for the sinking of the German auxiliary cruiser Cape Trafalgar, destroyed by the Carmania in South American waters in September, 1914.

The bounty was estimated on the basis of 423 persons on board the Cape Trafalgar when she sank. This is the first application ever heard in the prize court for prize bounty.

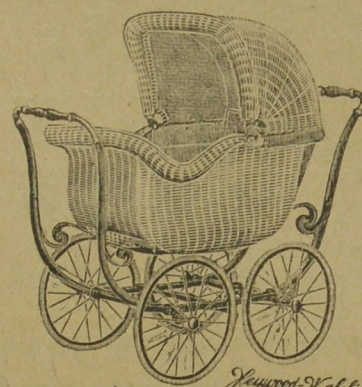
WOUNDED IN FRANCE.

London, March 27.—The threatened strike of the Liverpool carters has been avoided. The men have accepted the terms recommended by a government conciliation board.

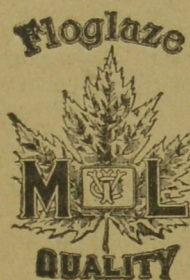

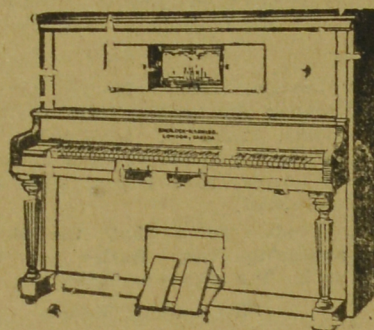
