U. N. B. SOPHOMORES LOST TO ST. JOHN Y.M.C.A. INTERMEDIATE TEAM

Score Was 32 to 25 in Fast Game at College Gym Saturday Night--Game Was Close.

The Y.M.C.A. Intermediate basketball team of St. John won from the U.N.B. Sophomores at the College gym Saturday night by a score of 32 to 25.

The U.N.B. team had the lead at the close of the first period by the narrow margin of 14 to 13. In this period McIntosh had scored two field goals and Bennett three from the field and four fouls as well, while the St. John team's scoring had consisted of two field goals by Ketchum and four field throws and a penalty throw by White.

The second half was fast and the St. John team steadily forged ahead. White got three field goals and scored on two fouls, Ketchum got two field throws and put a penalty throw in the basket, and Gillen got into the scoring with two field goals, which made the St. John team's score 30. For the Sophs. Bridges scored three field goals, while Bennett scored five fouls, making U.N.B.'s total for the half only 11 points and bringing the total up to 25.

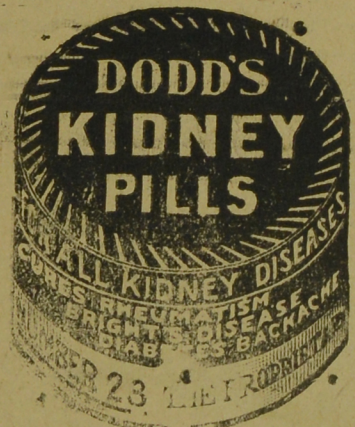

CANADIENS HAVE STRONG GRIP ON THE STANLEY CUP

Beat Portland Rosebuds 6 to 3 Saturday Night--Police on Ice to Stop Fight.

Montreal, March 26—Canadiens, on Saturday night, in the Montréal Arena, defeated Portland in the second of the three games in the contest for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the Canadian hockey championship, the score being 6 to 3. In the third period a free fight developed, being started by Johnson of Portland, and Lalonde of the Canadiens. The police stopped the row, and playing was resumed, with Portland handicapped by two of their players being benched for their share in the fracas.

The next game will be played on Tuesday night.

The majority of goals count for the championship. The standing in three games is: Canadiens 8, Portland 6.

FIFTY LIVES LOST ON STEAMER SUSSEX

Marseilles, March 26—The British liner Minneapolis was sunk in the Mediterranean last Wednesday by a submarine, according to Captain Bibbie of the British steamer Leicestershire, which has arrived here from Rangoon.

Captain Bibbie reports that while in the Mediterranean last Wednesday he received a wireless call for help from the Minneapolis, which said that the steamer had just been torpedoed and was sinking.

The Leicestershire went at full speed to the assistance of the Minneapolis, but arrived too late, the vessel having sunk. The fate of the crew was not known to Captain Bibbie.

The Minneapolis was a steamer of 13,543 tons gross. She was built in 1900 at Belfast and was owned by the Atlantic Transport Company. Late shipping records do not give the movements of the vessel, which probably was in the British government service. Prior to the war the Minneapolis plied between American ports and London.

Another Gone.

London, March 26—The British steamer St. Cecilia, from Portland, Maine, March 11, for London, has been sunk, according to a despatch to Lloyds from Dover. The crew was saved.

Loyds reports that the British steamship Fenay Bridge has been sunk. The crew was landed.

Fifty Lost on Sussex.

Paris, March 25—The ministry of marine, in an official statement issued tonight, declares that the Sussex was torpedoed, and estimates the number of victims at about fifty.

The text of the official statement which was issued Saturday night, reads:

"The British steamer Sussex, which carried about 380 passengers, was torpedoed on the channel on the 24th by an enemy submarine.

"The captain observed a torpedo about one hundred metres from the side, and immediately manoeuvred to avoid it, but the vessel was struck in the forward part, which was destroyed.

WILLARD HOLDS CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE WITHOUT TROUBLE

Easily Outpointed Frank Moran at Madison Sq., Garden Saturday Night--Broke His right hand.

New York, March 25—Jess Willard champion heavyweight of the world easily outpointed Frank Moran in ten-round bout here tonight. Willard had the better on points in every round, except the third, which went to Moran by a narrow margin, and the eighth and ninth, which were even.

The conqueror of Jack Johnson claimed to have broken all the bones in the back of his right hand during a slashing rally in the third, and it was noticeable that he did not use his right to any extent in the later rounds. Occasionally he uppercut to Moran's body or jaw with that hand, but it lacked the punishing power shown in his training work.

The chief feature of Moran's battle was his gameness. Although he could make no impression on Willard with his hardest swings, he fought steadily and courageously under a fusillade of left jabs and hooks, which battered his face and almost closed his left eye toward the end of the bout. Several times Moran was dazed by the champion's smashes, but Willard, fighting with his usual lack of aggressiveness, did not appear to try particularly for a knockout. The champion never was in danger from Moran's blows, although a number landed with crashing force on his jaw and body. Most of them, however, either were blocked or avoided by the Kansas cowboy, who took full advantage of his great height and extraordinary reach.

Willard, whose weight was announced at 259½ pounds in ring costume, towered over Moran, who weighed only 201½ pounds, when the pair shook hands a few minutes before ten o'clock.

The fall of the past destroyed part of the antennae of the wireless; moreover, when an aerial wire was improvised, the operator, by an error, reported an incorrect position, which misled the torpedo boats on patrol boats, and as a result retarded the arrival of help.

"The patrol boat Marie Therese nevertheless, managed to find the distressed vessel and brought back to Boulogne a majority of the passengers. Others were taken to England by British torpedo boat destroyers, which had arrived at the scene of the disaster at about the same time as the Marie Therese.

"The Sussex was towed to Boulogne by a steamer from that port, and is now there in security.

"Unhappily the explosion and the beginning of a panic among the passengers resulted in some victims. The exact number at this hour is not known, but it is estimated to be about fifty."

Scarcely any doubt existed at the American embassy last night that some American lives have been lost in the disaster.

The depositions of some of the American survivors who have arrived at Paris were taken by the embassy; they will be forwarded to the state department at Washington.

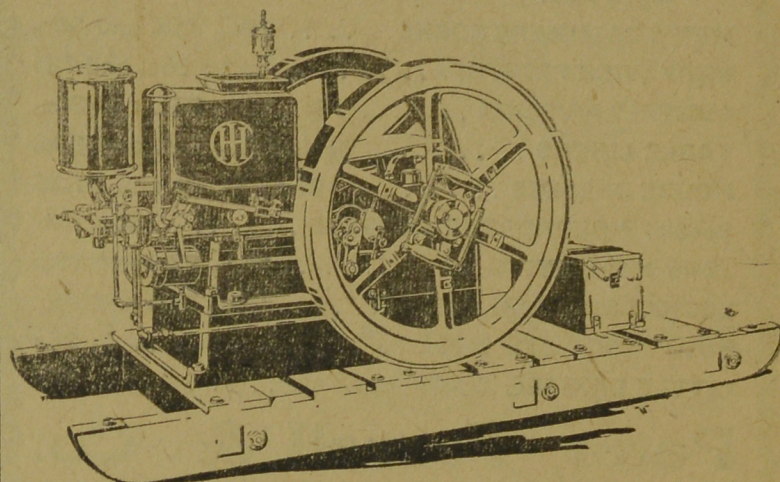
