## Discover Malignant Bacillus

(Boston Record.)

One of the most notable recent  
discoveries in the medical world—  
that of the germ of scarlet fever—  
has been made by two Boston physi-  
cians, Dr. F. B. Mallory, pathologist  
at the Boston City Hospital, and  
his assistant, Dr. E. M. Medlar.

After two years' search through  
the microscope, Dr. Mallory discov-  
ered the germ that has been puzzling  
the medical science and which has  
been hunted for by bacteriologists  
for years. Dr. Mallory told *The Re-*  
*cord* of his discovery today, but said  
that his work is only partially com-  
plete. He declared further that most  
of his work has been done with the  
human scarlet fever bacillus and  
that his work with animals has not  
been so conclusive.

With this important discovery ef-  
forts are being made by the two doc-  
tors to work out an antitoxin that  
will fight the disease and a vaccine  
that will prevent the possibility of  
contagion.

Dr. Mallory is of the opinion that  
a vaccine is all that will be neces-  
sary, as the treatment of the disease  
is well understood at the present  
time, so well, in fact, that there are  
fewer and fewer deaths each year  
from it, and in the Boston City Hos-  
pital there has not been one for a  
long time.

## SPRING MILLINERY.

With the telling of the tale of  
spring millinery, hats for young  
girls are not forgotten, and while  
some assume a dignity of mature  
age by means of their simplicity,  
others are piquantly childish, with  
drooping brims and flower-laden  
crowns. While some depend upon  
straw for their foundation, others  
give ruffled expression of high re-  
gard for tulle, which, plaited and  
frilled and combined with straw or  
ribbon, achieves adorable effects.

The model here depicted is one  
manifested of tulle, which, if de-  
sired, may be supplanted by silk.  
Though its fullness is thrice gird-  
ed about the crown, its capricious  
tendencies give vent at top and  
bottom, flaring into crisp frills.  
Brown straw for the narrow, droop-  
ing brim is becomingly faced with  
dull blue faille ribbon, which ties  
in tiny bows at the back. A vari-  
egated miniature bouquet posed on  
the very edge of the brim on the  
right weights it a bit while holding  
one of the velvet streamers.

The broad trimmed model which  
is turned up in the back is pretty  
for the girl who arranges her hair  
in a way to demand a large bow.  
For a crown of dark blue straw  
which is completed with Georgette  
crepe is a brim of the straw, which  
necessitates Georgette crepe to  
complete it. Covered top and bot-  
tom to within an inch of the edge,  
a tiny plaited frill of rose silk rib-  
bon favors the top, the same hav-  
ing already offered its trimming  
qualities to the crown. In front a  
towering group of roses add a dig-  
nified picturesqueness to the cre-  
ation.

## SOME NEW RECIPES.

**Banana Cream**—After peeling  
bananas, mash with an iron or  
wooden spoon. Allow equal quan-  
tities of bananas add sweet cream;  
to one quart of the mixture allow  
one-quarter of a pound of sugar.  
Beat them altogether until the  
cream is light.

**Banana Salad**—Whip one cup  
cream, add two tablespoons lemon  
juice and two teaspoons sugar; gar-  
nish dish with lettuce; cut banana  
in quarters or any shape desired  
and put the dressing on with cut  
walnuts. Very nice for tea.

**St. James Pudding**—Take three  
tablespoons butter, one-half cup  
molasses, one-half cup of milk, one  
and one-half cups flour, one-half  
teaspoon soda, pinch of salt, one-

quarter teaspoon mixed spice, one-  
half pound raisins. Steam three  
hours. Serve with cream.

**Fruit Gems**—Cream half cupful  
of butter with one cupful brown  
sugar, add one egg well beaten,  
one cupful sour milk in which one  
teaspoonful of soda has been dis-  
solved, two teaspoonfuls of cocoa,  
one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-  
half teaspoon of allspice, two cups  
sifted flour, one cupful of chopped  
seeded raisins, half cup currants;  
bake in gem pans; ice with maple  
or chocolate frosting.
