WOMAN'S COLUMN

MATCH YOUR BAG AND FROCK.

Many of the new handbags are made of the material of the frock with which they are worn, and the lining is of a contrasting color. These bags are attractive when made in three sections, forming a three sided bag, ending in a long, three sided point. The point can be edged with narrow steel bead fringe or it can be ended in a button or tassel. Striped linings are also effective for these bags.

A TOUCH OF COLOR.

A pretty finish for a white nightgown is a binding of colored bias folds of muslin. This folded bias finish can be bought, both in plain colors and stripes and plaids. The sleeves and neck can be bound in this way and a band of the colored fold can be placed at the line of an empire waistline, to have ribbon run under it. In the same manner, chiffon or Georgette crepe underwear can be finished with ribbon used as binding.

BAKING PRECEPTS.

Do you use the paper test for your oven? Before putting a cake in to be baked, a piece of paper should be laid on the shelf of the oven. When the paper is a light brown the cake should be put in and both burners turned down to about half their full force. When this method is followed an even baking almost certainly results.

The placement of the cake in the oven is very important. Any cake, such as loaf cake, which requires a slow heat, should be set in the centre of the oven. Layer cakes, popovers, etc., need faster heat, and should be put on the top shelf of the oven.

Asbestos mats are unnecessary for oven use in baking, with one exception. A fruit cake, which is stiff and full of numerous heavy ingredients, needs a long slow baking, and for this an asbestos mat is good, as it keeps the cake from getting too brown on the bottom.

BAKED BEANS AND TOMATOES.

Did you ever bake beans with tomatoes? If not, try some. Soak a pint of beans over night; in the morning parboil and place in two-quart bean pot. Add to them a level tablespoon of salt, two of molasses, one teaspoon black pepper and one quart of hot water. Place the pot in a cool oven and bake slowly; as the water boils away or is absorbed by the beans fill the pot with tomatoes (canned or fresh may be used; if fresh, cut them into pieces). Long and slow baking is required, and one quart of tomatoes should be used. If more moisture is required after this has been used add hot water. Let cook at least 10 hours—12 is better. This is a delicious dish and can be rewarmed as often as necessary.

LATE HATCHED CHICKS.

Have Their Value—Often Make Good Midsummer Layers.

The advice usually given is to hatch chicks early, which is good, but late chicks, hatched in August, September, or even October, have value too. It has been my observation, says a successful poultry breeder, that the very best show specimens are hatched in April and May, but chicks hatched later than this have a place, especially on the farm.

Often there is more time to care for them, feed is more plentiful and lower in price, and there is not usually so much rain. The late summer and fall hatched pullets make good midsummer layers.

When frosty weather comes care must be taken of the late chicks' quarters, otherwise colds will be prevalent and growth will be checked.

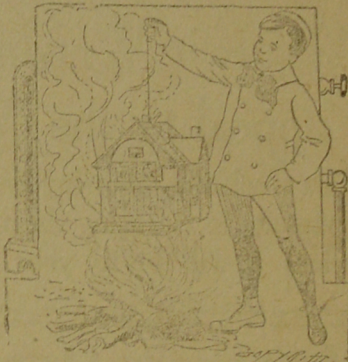

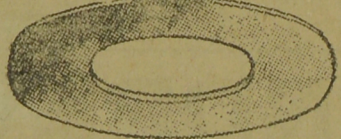
