RUSSIANS ENDEAVORING TO CUT OFF TURKISH RETREAT

The Russian army which captured Erzerum, in Armenia, is endeavoring to cut off the retreat of the Turks, who are retiring with as much speed as possible. Despatches from Petrograd report the capture of the towns of Mush and Achlat, to the south, and heavy fighting preceding the taking of the towns by storm. The next objective of the southern wing of the Russian army is Diarbekr, which lies within striking distance of the Bagdad railway. This line would open up the road for the Russians into Syria.

Along the Black Sea coast the Russian warships are pounding at Turkish batteries and harassing the retreating troops. The northern wing of the Russian army has captured the town of Widje and is driving the Turks back in the direction of Gumish-Khan, on the road to Trebizond, while large Russian forces are moving westward from Erzerum with the object of cutting off these Turkish htroops before they can reach a new line of defence.

On Western Front.

The Germans have been operating vigorously against the British and the French along the Yser canal, to the north of Ypres. From the British 350 metres of a position was captured and

held, Berlin says, despite hand grenade attacks to recapture it. After a heavy bombardment the Germans attempted to cross the canal and occupy French positions, and several groups of them did succeed in making their way to a French line trench. The French, however, immediately drove them back. The British to the south of Loos, in a lively engagement, succeeded in making an advance to the edge of a mine crater held by the Germans.

The French in the Argonne forest exploded a mine and shattered the German works.

Italians in Albania.

In Albania the Austro-Hungarians report the capture near Bazar-Sajak, of an advanced Italian position. This is the first indication that the Italians were operating so far north in Albania, the belief being that they had confined their activities to the vicinity of Avlona.

The Albanians fighting with the Teutonic allies have occupied the town of Berat, 31 miles northeast of Avlona.

Unofficial advices from Saloniki report that a Bulgarian patrol which crossed the Greek frontier was repelled by Greek troops.

APPAM SEIZED AT OWNER'S BEHEST

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 21—It is said the British owners of the liner Appam, in Hampton Roads, as a prize of a German cruiser, have brought an admiralty proceeding under the prize laws to regain possession of the ship.

The state department held that under the Prussian-American treaty, the liner belongs to Germany as a prize, at least until a prize court passed on the legality of her capture. The British embassy had contended the ship should be returned to her owners under a provision of The Hague convention.

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 20—Federal Judge Waddill passed the usual libel process today and the Appam was seized by a deputy United States marshal, who went to Newport News on a tug for the purpose. Two guards from the office of the United States Court were left in charge of the Appam.

Comrie Castle Has Been Floated

(Canadian Press.) London, Feb. 21—The British steamer Comrie Castle, which went ashore last week on a reef off Mombassa, British East Africa, has been refloated.

AUSTRIAN IS ARRESTED.

Chief of Police McCollom of this city, went to Minto Saturday and arrested Dan Muellage, an Austrian who had broken parole at Jogbins Mines and River Hebert. Muellage was brought to Fredericton and will be sent to the Detention Camp at Amherst tonight or tomorrow.

TEN RECRUITS.

Ten recruits were sworn in at the local recruiting office last week. This number is below the average of some weeks past. It is expected there will be an improvement this week.

Sergt. Clem McLeod has taken his discharge from the 36th Field Battery. It is understood that he will get a commission in a new battalion to be raised in Nova Scotia by Lt. Col. John Stanfield, M.P.

MRS. J.W. WEAVER DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Wife of Well Known Physician Succumbs After a Week's Illness.

The lamented death occurred on Saturday evening at her home in Queen street of Mrs. Emily Gertrude Weaver, wife of Dr. W. J. Weaver, after a week's illness from pneumonia complicated with heart failure. The news of the fatal termination of her illness came as a great shock to the community and expressions of regret are heard on every side.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Mr. Livingston Dibblee of Lower Woodstock, and had resided here since her marriage to Dr. Weaver, about eleven years ago. She was a bright and charming woman and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's memorable tribute to the two ladies who perished in the Ottawa fire a fortnight ago are specially applicable to the late Mrs. Weaver. "She was a young, happy wife, a young, happy mother, bright as the lark in the blue sky of the morning."

Besides a sorrowing husband, Mrs. Weaver is survived by one daughter, Miss Joyce Weaver. Her mother also survives and there are two sisters, Mrs. L. H. Bliss and Mrs. A. A. Shute of this city, and three brothers, Rev. H. E. Dibblee, rector of Christchurch, Amherst, and Messrs. Reginald R. and Thaddeus F. Dibblee of Lower Woodstock.

The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon with services at the Cathedral at 2.30 o'clock. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

THREE ALARMS OF FIRE LAST NIGHT AND TODAY

The cold snap which has prevailed for several days gave the firemen some work today as there were three alarms Sunday night and this morning. No damage was done at two of the fires but the other gave the firemen an hour's work with the chemical extinguishers.

At 10.15 Sunday night a still alarm called the firemen to Miss Ella Hanlon's residence, King street. There was no damage, the alarm being for a burning chimney.

At 3.40 this morning there was a still alarm for a fire at the residence of William Haining. The fire originated from a defective fire place and worked its way into the floor. Part of the flooring and a joist were burned. The firemen worked at the fire for about an hour.

At 9.30 this morning, an alarm was rung in from Box 36, at the corner of Charlotte and Carleton streets, for an overheated pipe at the residence of Frank G. Foster. There was no damage.

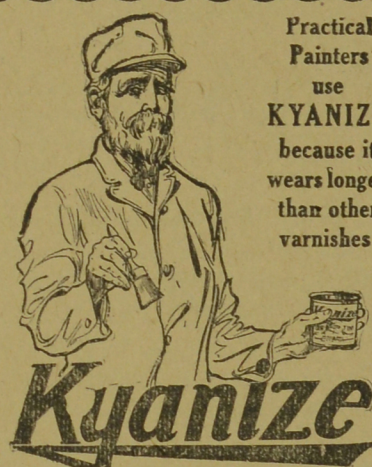

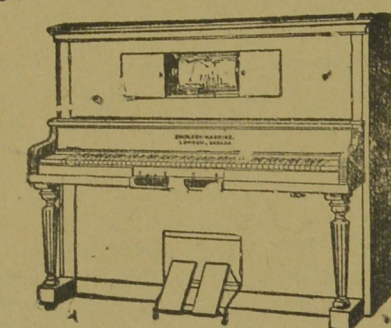
