

FRED TENNEY TO BE
MANAGER OF JERSEY CITY

New York, Feb. 18--The Jersey City franchise of the International League, which will be transferred to Newark this season, was finally auctioned off today by President Edw. and Barroe of the league. Barrow held up the sale of the Jersey City franchise for several weeks to allow Oscar Lustig and a syndicate of Newark business men sufficient time to raise \$25,000.

The \$25,000 was not forthcoming and today Barrow sold the franchise and about ten players to Jim Price, one-time newspaperman and former Boxing Commissioner of this city; Fred Tenney, formerly of the Giants and Boston Braves, and Harry Clay Smith, a wealthy Chicago man and personal friend of Ban John son. Tenney will manage the team.

PERSONAL!

Effective March 1, the price of the Chalmers Six-40 in Canada will be \$1950. This is an increase of \$100 over the present price. It is made necessary by the sharp rise in cost of raw materials.

Aluminum, which sold for 19 cents a pound only a few months ago, now brings 53 cents.

Copper has risen from 14 cents to 24 cents. Vanadium steel a year ago brought \$1.85 a pound. Now it sells for \$8.50.

High speed steel, formerly at \$1.05 a pound, now is worth \$3.25.

Leather formerly 20 cents a foot now brings 33 cents, and so on.

All told, it costs \$118.22 more in raw material to build the Six-40 than it did some months ago. As this amount is considerably in excess of our net profit per car, only two courses were open to us.

One was to raise the price.

The other was to lower the quality.

To follow the latter course meant a "oneyear" car. This kind of an automobile Chalmers has never built and never will build.

Therefore, rise in price was the only procedure possible.

We regret that an increase in price is necessary, but we feel that other manufacturers of automobiles will be forced either to increase the price or use a lower grade of materials.
