### COM. H. R. McLELLAN OF ST. JOHN GIVES EVIDENCE HERE

Called in C. T. A. Case to Discredit Police Sergt. Marshall—Evidence In Case Completed This Morning.

The Canada Temperance Act case arising out of the raid by the police on the Lorne Hotel on October 8th was finished this morning in the police court. His Honor the Police Magistrate adjourned the case until Thursday, the 23rd inst. The chief feature of the proceedings was the calling as witnesses by the defence of Mr. H. R. McLellan, Commissioner of Public Safety, of the City of St. John; Mr. Harry Ervin, city editor of the St. John Standard; Mr. William Duncan, ex-sergeant of the Fredericton police force, and the defendant in the case. The evidence of the first three witnesses was for the purpose of discrediting Police Sergt. Charles H. Marshall of this city, who found the flask of liquor in the raid on the hotel. The principal fact in their evidence was that they considered Sergt. Marshall unreliable and untrustworthy, and would not believe him under oath. The evidence of the defendant was to the effect that he did not recognize the brand of whiskey which was alleged to have been found by Sergt. Marshall at the time of the raid, and that it had never been sold in his hotel. Under cross-examination the witness said he did not buy the liquor which was stocked by the hotel. Mr. P. J. Hughes was counsel for the defence and Mr. R. B. Hanson for the prosecution. During cross-examination there were some interesting

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### CITY SCHOOLS RAISED \$628.69 FOR BELGIAN CHILDREN

Total in Sight From Province About \$14,000--Doak School Did Particularly Well --Some Individual Efforts.

The teachers and pupils of Fredericton raised the sum of \$628.69 on the birthday of King Albert of Belgium, Wednesday, November 15th, for the Belgian Children's Relief Fund. This sum will be handed over to the Education Department. Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, stated this morning that \$14,000 was now in sight from all parts of the province, but would be increased. He said that he could make no forecast of the total contributions, but felt gratified on account of the showing made. About \$7,000 was deposited in the bank yesterday and \$2,500 was received this morning in addition to that amount.

It is reported that in St. John City some \$3,000 was collected. The showing of the rural schools of Carleton county has been particularly gratifying.


