LIBERALS WON GREAT VICTORY IN TORY TORONTO

Mr. Hartley H. Dewart, K. C. Won By-Election by Decisive Majority of 643--Four Candidates Were in the Fight--A Stunning Blow for the Hearst Govt.

Toronto, Aug. 21.—In one of the most peculiar topsy-turvy by-elections which Ontario has experienced, the Liberal candidate—Liberal on his record, and the nominee of a Liberal convention, though not endorsed by the central executive—H. H. Dewart, K. C., was elected to the Legislature tonight as representative of Southwest Toronto by a majority of 643 over Jas. Norris, Conservative candidate, the vote for the other candidates being negligible.

There were four candidates in the field.

Mr. Dewart, a supporter of the Rowell policies, with the exception of the prohibition plant, on which he reserved the right of individual judgment in case of an "emergency;" Mr. James Norris, who frankly expressed himself in favor of a modification of the Ontario temperance act passed at the last session of the Legislature, but was accepted by Premier Hearst as a supporter; Mr. Gordon Waldron, who came out flat-footed against the prohibition policy of both government and opposition, and had the platform support of Sir Allen Aylsworth, formerly minister of justice in the Laurier cabinet, who in several speeches lamented the tying up of the Liberal party in

the province to the prohibition policy, and Mr. J. McA. Connor, who ran as a Social Democrat, but was the only candidate who distinctly favored prohibition.

Mr. Dewart, the victor, though the nominee of a Liberal convention, was practically repudiated by the two local Liberal organs, the Star openly advocating the cause of the Social Democrat on the prohibition question, and the Globe remaining neutral. The Independent-Nickel-Conservative World threw its influence into the camp of Mr. Dewart. The Mail and Empire and the News were behind Mr. Norris, and the Evening Telegram came out as an eleventh hour supporter.

The vote polled was comparatively light, compared with that in the last general election, when the late Hon. J. J. Foy rolled up a majority of 3,696.

In that election the total vote polled was 6,127, as compared with 5,343 in the by-election today.

Following is the vote for the various candidates: Dewart, 2,705; Norris, 2,062; Connor, 445; Waldron, 131.

This is the first time in twenty-seven years that a Toronto constituency has elected a Liberal to the legislature. In 1889 the late Jos. Tait, Liberal was elected under the minority representation plan.

LIQUOR SEIZED LAST NIGHT AT C.P.R. STATION

Consigned to Fictitious Persons—Police Commission Awarded Contract.

The Police Commission met yesterday afternoon and awarded the contract for furnishing four raincoats for the police to Mr. J. A. McKinnon. The Commission decided also to call for tenders for caps for the police. Chairman McKay stated this morning that there was no further business, but some discussion concerning police matters.

The force is continuing its activity in connection with Canada Temperance Act matters. Four cases of gin and two barrels of bottled ale were seized at the C. P. R. station last night by Policemen Marshall and Jones. The consignees were Osborne Kelly and Harold Jack. Both names, the police say, are fictitious. The liquor was shipped via Dominion Express, the ale being marked "flour" and the gin marked "prunes."

EIGHTY-FIVE THOUSAND PAID INTO CITY TREASURY

More Than Two Thirds of Total Assessment--Greatest on Record.

The amount of city taxes for 1916-17 paid into the city treasury during the discount period was \$84,999.25. This is the largest sum ever paid in during the discount period, and also the largest proportion of the total assessment ever paid in during a similar period.

The total assessment for the year amounts to \$125,000, so that the amount subject to discount is slightly greater than two-thirds of the total.

Yesterday's collections amounted to \$30,082.56, being the largest for the last day of any discount period.

In 1915 the amount paid in during the discount period was \$67,000 and in 1914 \$58,000.

Refused to Endorse Daylight Saving

Montreal, Aug. 22.—The Union of Canadian Municipalities this morning refused to endorse daylight saving and defeated a resolution introduced at its annual session here by Mayor Church of Toronto, asking the Dominion government to bring in the scheme all over the Dominion of Canada.

IMPORTANT GAINS BY BRITISH TROOPS

London, Aug. 22.—British troops on the Somme front have advanced along a line half a mile long in the region of Pozieres, and have also made an advance near the Leipsic salient, it was officially announced today.

Twenty Bodies Have Been Recovered

London, Aug. 22.—The bodies of 20 persons killed by the explosion yesterday at a munition factory in Yorkshire have been recovered.

Considerable destruction of property also resulted.

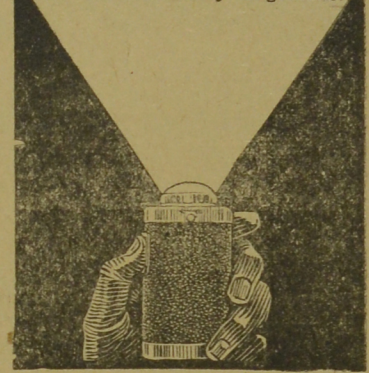
