PLANING-MILL OF FRASER LIMITED TO BEGIN OPERATIONS

Season Will Open Tomorrow - Conditions in United States Lumber Market Reported to be Greatly Improved

The planing mill which forms part of the plant of Fraser Limited at Victoria Mills in this city, will begin operations for the season tomorrow, according to present expectations. The big mill will not start until the opening of navigation. The early starting of the planing mill is said to be the result of improved conditions in the lumber market.

This lumber market in the United States has displayed a marked tendency to improve during the past few weeks. This tendency is said to be due to industrial activity caused by war orders from Europe. The expansion of certain plants used for the manufacture of munitions has caused building booms in certain American cities and a consequent increased demand for lumber of all kinds.

In Great Britain it is said that conditions point to improved conditions in the lumber market.

In Maine spruce logs recently were sold at a record price and the cut of lumber in that state will not meet the demand. Operators who curtailed their cut during the present log-line season now are regretting it. In New Brunswick also the cut was curtailed but conditions now point to an active demand for lumber.

NIGHT MARCH OF 36TH BATTERY FOR TOMORROW

Unit Will Parade in Drill Hall at 9. 30--Battery Has Become Very Popular With Fredericton People.

The 36th Field Battery will have a night march-out Friday night. This will be in the nature of a novelty as all other march-outs of the Battery have been in the daytime. Major Crowe will be in command, the other officers being Capt. Teed, Lieut. Shreve and Lieut. Harris. The strength will be 138 of all ranks.

According to orders, the Battery will parade at 9.30 in the drill hall in marching order. The march will cover some of the chief streets of the city and probably will be witnessed by a large number of citizens. The Fredericton Brass Band is to furnish music for the march-out.

This unit of artillery, the fourth field battery to be quartered in Fredericton since the outbreak of the war, has made a host of friends in this city since coming here from Sydney, N.S., last autumn and the citizens of Fredericton will regret its departure, which, it is understood, will come at an early date. It is announced that His Worship Mayor Mitchell, before the Battery leaves on its march tomorrow night, will formally express the good feeling of the citizens toward the troops. The 36th Battery, although primarily a Cape Breton unit, has recruited to some extent here and a number of Fredericton men are members of it.

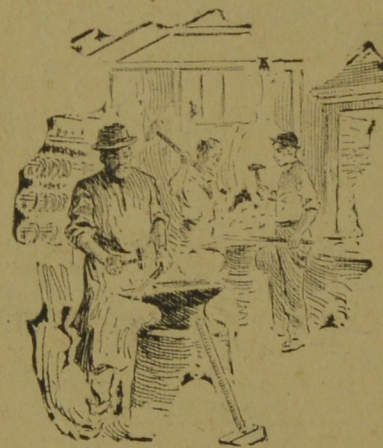
