THE ANGELICAN SYNOD CONCLUDES ITS LABORS

The Diocesan Synod closed its sessions at the City Opera House last evening shortly after six o'clock. As usual, the next session will take place in St. John. The date is the first Tuesday in February, 1917.

Yesterday afternoon balloting on the various boards and committees was completed. A number of reports were received and adopted. They were those of the committee on memorials to deceased members, committee on the upkeep of the Cathedral, the secretary on the affixing of the Synod seal, report of the treasurer, report of the women's auxiliary.

During the session a resolution expressing the warmest congratulations to Rev. Dr. J. Roy Campbell and Rev. W. B. Armstrong upon completing fifty years of service in the ministry was passed, on motion of Rev. A. H. Crowfoot, seconded by A. B. Pipes. Rev. Dr. Campbell replied and in the course of his reply said he had attended forty-two sessions of the Synod.

On the motion of Rev. A. C. Fenwick, a resolution of regret on account of the sudden death of Rev. E. B. Doane was also passed.

On motion the following committee on the mobilization of the spiritual forces was appointed: Canon Cowie, Rev. R. P. McKim, Very Rev. Dean Neales, Canon Smithers, Rev. G. F. Scovill, Rev. A. H. Crowfoot, Rev. L. R. Sherman, Canon Daniel, Venerable Archdeacon Forsythe.

When the business standing over from last session was taken up, the decision to permit of the election of lay delegates to the Synod in January or at Easter was confirmed.

Rev. G. F. Scovill's motion for a special committee to consider the matter of holding a summer school at Rothesay was carried, after a

long discussion. Some of the clergy favored holding a retreat for the clergy, and others of combining the two.

On the motion of J. Simeon Armstrong, the Synod committed itself to the support of the Church of England Men's Society. A special committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the diocese. The Bishop, J. E. Purdie, Rev. R. M. Fulton, Very Rev. Dean Neales, Canon Smithers, J. S. Armstrong, B. C. Barclay Boyd, E. H. Hoyt and C. Coster.

A resolution to the effect that the members do their utmost to promote the Lord's Day was passed.

THE OTTAWA FIRE

"The Providence Journal three weeks ago notified the department of Justice at Washington that it had received information directly through employees of the German Embassy that the Parliament House at Ottawa, Rideau Hall, the home of the Governor General in Ottawa, and large munitions plants in Ontario, were to be the next objects of German attack on this continent, in the order named.

"The Journal furthermore notified the Department of Justice at the same time that the German Embassy have given instructions that the work of destruction in American munitions plants should be temporarily suspended, and that the next move to be made would 'give the people of Canada a few things to think about.'

"The statement was also made by the Embassy that the arrest of Koenig and the prevention of the destruction of the Welland Canal would only stimulate these activities in Canada."

Denied at Ottawa. Ottawa, Feb. 4.—It is stated that the Justice Department received no warning from the Providence Journal or from the Justice Department at Washington with reference to any projected attack to be made on the Canadian House.
