

Woman's Column

MARION HOLMES' RECIPES.

Halibut With Sauce.

Halibut with Hollandaise sauce is cheap and simple enough to make. Clean a slice of halibut, brush it over with melted butter, sprinkle with salt, pepper and onion juice, put it in a baking pan, cover with paper and bake fifteen minutes. So much for the fish itself. To make the sauce, put a half tablespoonful of vinegar and the yolk of two eggs into a saucepan and set this into a larger pan of boiling water. Stir it quickly with a wire spoon, gradually adding three-quarters of a cupful of butter. When the sauce thickens, remove from the fire and add a few grains of cayenne and salt.

Stuffed Beef.

Take a slice of round steak, not too thick, salt and spread with a good dressing. If the slice is large enough it can be rolled like a jelly roll, otherwise bring the edges together. Sew securely, brown well on all sides in a buttered spider. Lay in kettle and boil or simmer slowly with a little water till tender, turning occasionally. Be careful not to break open; there will be a rich brown gravy. Have one meal hot and the rest cold. Cut in slices.

Fresh Lemonade.

Boil three-quarters of a pound of sugar in one quart of water for ten minutes. Squeeze the juice from six lemons. Place the rinds in the sugar and water and allow to stand for one and one-half hours. Add the juice of the lemons and strain all through a piece of muslin. Dilute with two quarts of water and serve in tall glasses. A small piece of ice added to each glass is a great improvement.

Eggs in Spinach.

Left over spinach, two cups; eggs, four; butter, one tablespoon; salt, one-fourth teaspoon. Arrange spinach in a buttered casserole. Make depressions in the spinach and into each depression break an egg. Sprinkle with salt and bits of butter. Cover and bake until spinach is heated and eggs set.

Popcorn Souffle.

Into six well beaten eggs stir one cup of finely ground and popped corn. Add a pinch of salt and dash of pepper. Pour into hot buttered baking dish and place in hot oven until fluffy and brown. Remove gently from oven and serve at once before it falls.

HEALTH AND BEAUTY.

Do not neglect to brush and comb the hair and massage the scalp merely to save a curl or wave.

An iron that is heated to the right degree may not injure the hair. The use of kids is always safe, although the process of curling or waving takes more time.

People who are "run down" are particularly subject to chilblains in cold weather, so it is essential to keep fit. Have a tonic made up if you feel below par. Eat good, nourishing food.

Warm underclothing is an essential to health. Sufferers from chilblains on the feet have found the wearing of good cotton stockings, as opposed to

woollen, most beneficial, especially if they have to do a great deal of walking.

HOT LEMONADE TO AVOID GRIPPE

Health Commissioner Emerson of New York city has approved the following suggestions for avoiding the gripple:

Take a cathartic. Then take a brief hot bath to warm up the body and start the blood running freely.

Drink a large bowl of hot lemonade and go to bed early. Cover one's self thoroughly and warmly, even to an extra pillow to protect the head and ears, and get nine hours' sleep.

Take the greatest care by dressing warmly, not to catch cold in the morning.

If the trouble seems to be chiefly in the throat, wrap the neck in a wet woollen cloth covered by a dry woollen cloth.

The official qualified his recommendation as far as the hot bath part of the treatment is concerned, saying that none should do this unless they were very sure that they would be able to keep themselves perfectly warm during the night and the morning afterward.

But the hot lemonade, the cathartic and the warm sleep stand as the official preventive.


