### HOUSEHOLD RECIPES

PEACH OR BERRY ROLY-POLY.

One cup flour.

One teaspoon baking powder. One-half teaspoon salt.

One-half teaspoon shortening.

Miced peaches. One cup sugar.

Two teaspoons butter.

One teaspoon milk.

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl, rub in shortening very lightly, add enough water to hold the dough together; le cu top. Roll lightly like jelly flour. well and put into buttered pudding pan. Brush the top with milk, aprinkle with sugar and put the butter that is left in small pieces on the top.

Bake in moderate oven 20 minates covered and 20 uncovered. add one cup of milk if desired. fore you can use them.

This makes four large portions.

MEAT CAKES.

Two cups of chopped cooked meat; three tablespoonfuls cracker crumbs, two eggs, two tablespoonfuls butter, one small onion, salt if he wasn't blind." and pepper to taste.
