MONTHLY MEETING OF THE VICTORIA HOSPITAL TRUSTEES

Fifty-Two Patients Treated During the Month of June--Balance of Judge Gregory's Legacy Turned Over to the Institution.

President VanDine occupied the chair at the regular monthly meeting of the Hospital Board yesterday. The other members in attendance included His Worship the Mayor, Dr. C. P. Holden, Mr. H. G. Kitchen and the Secretary-Treasurer.

The Treasurer's statement of expenditures for June was in the abnormal class, but included the cost of a year's coal supply and also payment of a modern sterilizer recently installed.

The report of the Superintendent showed that 52 patients were treated in the month of June. There were three deaths, and one of these, a man from the county, expressed his desire to leave the money he possessed to the hospital, but before his plans were matured he passed away.

As usual, friends have been thoughtful for the comfort of the patients, and the following donations were received: Ice cream from Mrs. Dr. McNally, one salmon from Mr. Henry Rainsford, two pillows from Miss Hunt, supply of towels, Dr. McNally; preserved fruit, Mrs. C. H. Weddall; year's subscription to the Daily Standard, Dr. VanWart; flowers from Mrs. Hawkins, Mrs. Weddall, Mrs. McKay; books, Mrs. McLellan; magazines, Mr. McMurray, Mrs. Geo. McDonald, Mrs. R. McLellan.

Judge Gregory's Bequest.

Reference was recently made to the valuable donation made to the hospital by Dr. Atherton just previous to his removal to California. The late

Mr. Justice Gregory left the sum of \$500 to the hospital, to be dispensed by Dr. Atherton in his best judgment. Of this amount the Doctor expended most judiciously the sum of \$300. Recently the Secretary-Treasurer received the balance of the legacy from Dr. Atherton. Mr. Justice F. B. Gregory, of Victoria, B. C., and Mr. J. Fraser Gregory, of St. John, sons of the deceased, have always manifested interest in our Fredericton hospital.

Will be Made to Pay.

Secretary Sampson reported a delinquent firm to whom was sold in good faith a dynamo and engine. This firm having failed in making payment, a legal member of the board will try his hand.

Upon request of Prof. Kelley, supported by Dr. Holden, some additions and repairs will be made to the X ray plant, and also to the valuable microscope which is in the professor's charge.

Mr. Fraser and those gentlemen associated with him in planning for the new building are not yet in a position to furnish any public information respecting the proposed structure. It will probably be a few weeks before the architect has the plans changed in accordance with Mr. Fraser's directions.

After the discussion of general matters and ordering the payment of a number of bills, the meeting adjourned.

OBJECTION TO PAYING BILL FROM MAGISTRATE

A bill for \$292.90 has been presented by Police Magistrate Limerick to the city in connection with twenty-eight Canada Temperance Act cases which were tried last winter on the information of M. E. Arscoff, a Toronto detective. Twenty-four of these cases were thrown out by the Supreme Court on appeal because the police court stenographer who took the evidence had not been sworn.

His Worship Mayor Mitchell placed a memorandum of the amount before the City Council in committee last night. He said that he and the magistrate had had a somewhat sharp exchange concerning the matter, as he (Mayor Mitchell) had asked why the city should pay a debt incurred through a mistake in the police court. His Worship also said that the chairman of the Police Commission had refused to endorse the payment of the item.

"That is one feather in his cap," remarked Ald. Burnett. "We cannot afford to pay for the education of the magistrate."

Ald. McLellan objected to the opinion expressed that the Police Magistrate should pay the bill.

As the matter was not formally before the Council, no action was taken.


