WAS LIKE THE MOUTH OF A FURNACE

London, July 3.—A despatch to the London Times from a correspondent at the British headquarters, describing the bombardment of German positions on the Somme, says: "There were positions which were like the mouths of furnaces, a permanent glow flecked and illumined with never ending streams of white sparks."

Hard to Count Them.


"One ordinarily measures the weight of a bombardment by the number of shells that burst in a minute. In this case ordinary methods of counting were helpless. Fixing my eyes on one spot I tried to wink them as fast as the lightning of the explosions, and the shells beat me badly. I then tried chattering my teeth, and I think that in that way I held my own approximately."

Testing it afterward in the light, where I could see a watch face, I found I could click my teeth some five or six times in a second. You can try it for yourself and clicking your own teeth will get some idea of the rate at which the shells were bursting on a single spot.

There were already three or four points within the field of vision at which they were bursting at that speed and always in between over the whole circuit of the field they were bursting with great, if lesser rapidity.

A Fierce Bombardment.

What the expenditure of ammunition is in such a bombardment it is impossible to conjecture, when along the front of ninety miles there are always points at which shells are bursting at the rate of some hundred to the minute, and this has already gone on for four days and four nights.

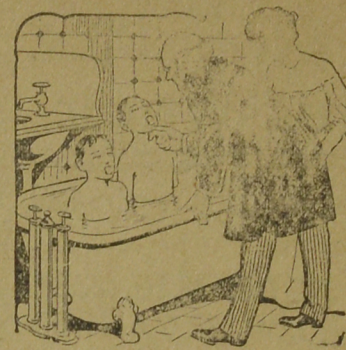

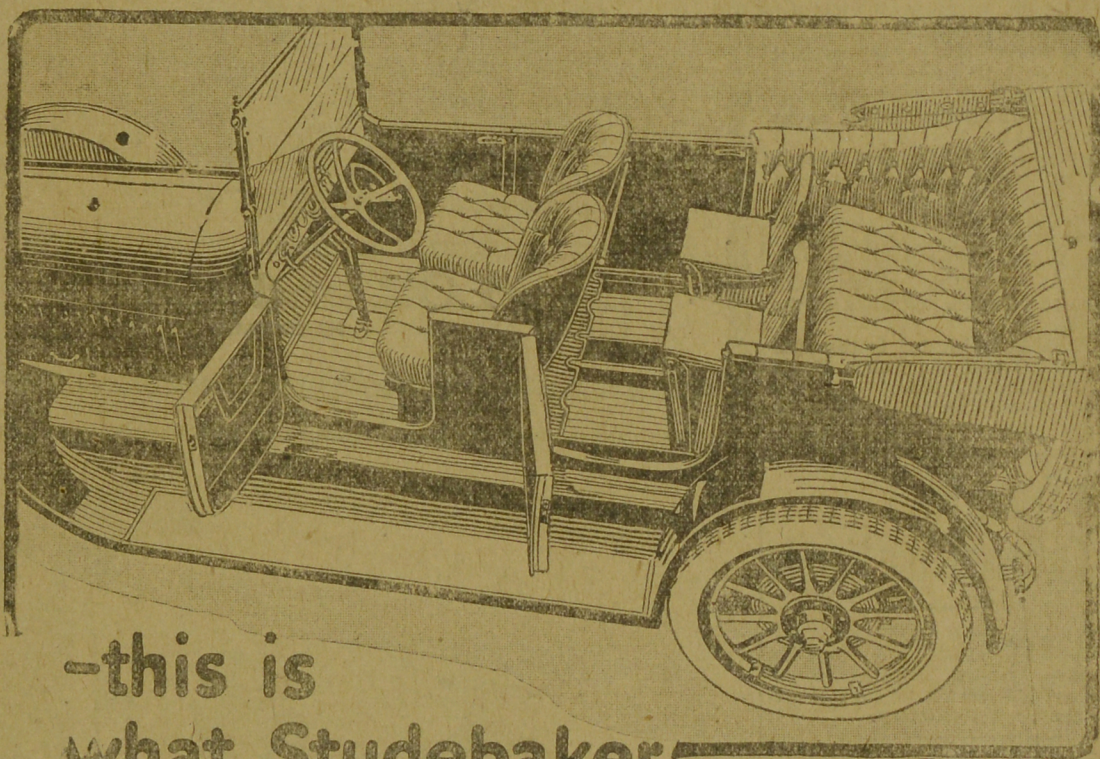

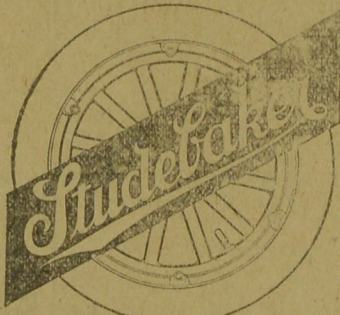
