HOUSEHOLD RECIPES MRS. LINCOLN'S RECIPES.

Boiled Frosting.

Take 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 tablespoonful of hot water, boil until it hairs, take the white of 1 egg, beat stiff, then pour in sugar, beating the whole till cold, flavor to suit. This will frost 2 cakes.

Deviled Eggs.

Carefully remove the shells of 6 hard-boiled eggs. Take a sharp knife and cut them in halves. Collect yolks in a bowl and add to them a tablespoonful of olive oil, a teaspoonful of vinegar, a salt-spoon of salt, a dash of red pepper and a scant saltspoon of dry mustard. With a silver fork beat this well together until it is thoroughly blended. If too thick, add a little more oil. If liked, add a teaspoon of grated onion. Cut a tiny slice from bottom of each half of the white of the eggs so that they will stand up, and fill them with the mixture just prepared. Serve on lettuce leaves.

Brown Sugar Sauce.

Rub together one cup of brown

sugar and half a cup and one table-spoonful of milk, till light and smooth. This is a fine sauce for rice pudding.

Hamburg Loaf.

Make a dressing by soaking stale bread until soft, then squeeze off the water, season with pepper, salt and sage, add 1 egg and a few pieces of butter, then stir in a pound of steak. Put into a greased pan and add a little hot water, bake about 1½ hours in a slow oven.

Fritters with Orange Sauce.

Beat the yolks of two eggs, add one cup milk, one-third teaspoon of salt and two-thirds cups flour and beat until very smooth. Sift in two teaspoons of baking powder beat well again, then fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop on soft paper and serve hot with orange sauce.

ORANGE SAUCE—Mix two tablespoonfuls of flour with one-half cup of sugar and one-fourth teaspoon of salt. Add one cup of boiling water, cook and stir 10 minutes, then add the juice of one orange and part of the grated yellow rind.

AMONG MILLIONS

One Lad Who Did Not Need the Pint of Soup That is the Daily Ration of the Belgian Today.

He was only a wisp of a lad, perhaps ten years old, but dwarfed and thin, and made even thinner in appearance by the scanty clothes he wore. He crawled into the Belgian relief depot in Brussels one night and without a word, without a whimper, curled up in a warm corner and quickly dropped off to sleep.

It was a common sight for the workers of the committee who face hunger, sickness and death from starvation daily, and the only remarks were:

"Poor little chap; let him sleep."

Morning came and the work resumed, for these workers know no rest. The lad still slept. As the soup steamed and bread was prepared one of the workers went to waken the little chap and give him his portion of soup—only a pint for the whole day; but it was too late.

Death had claimed this little fellow, the death that comes from protracted hunger. Another of the seven million gone—another victim of the machinations of the German conqueror, who has cut off all food supplies except the supplies coming through the Belgian Relief Committee.

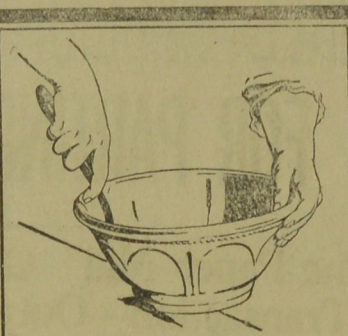
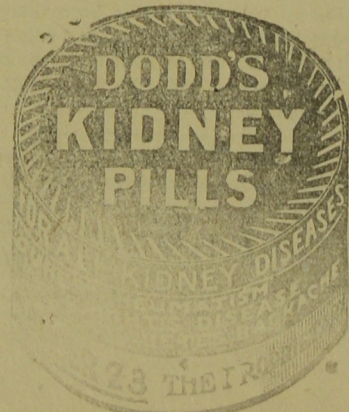
WOMEN WANT CONSCRIPTION.

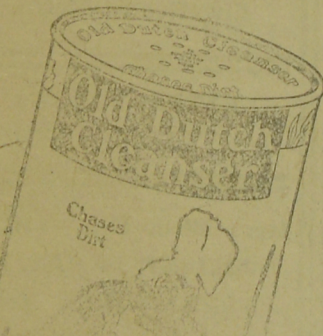
