DANISH CAPTAIN  
DESCRIBES BATTLE

Copenhagen, via London, June 3.—  
 The captain of the Danish steamer  
 Naesborg gives the following account  
 of the sea fight:  
 "When the Naesborg was 95 miles  
 west of Cape Hanstholm on the north-  
 west coast of Jutland, a few small British  
 warships appeared, pursued by the  
 German fleet. Suddenly the British  
 warships turned and steamed west-  
 ward, violently shelled.  
 "In a few minutes a large number of  
 British Dreadnought cruisers appear-  
 ed from the north and west.  
 "The British then began attacking  
 the German ships, which were rein-  
 forced by a large number of ships from  
 the south, along the west coast of Jut-  
 land. A violent fight ensued. The  
 sky seemed full of smoke and the sea  
 in a state of uproar.  
 "Shells fell around my steamer, al-  
 though we were several miles away."  
 "During the fight the cannonading  
 was so violent that our crew could not  
 stand on deck. We saw several large  
 warships sunk, but I am unable to say  
 whether they were British or German.  
 "At last the German fleet withdrew  
 southward, pursued by the British,  
 while several more British warships  
 appeared coming from the westward.  
 The German fleet was divided into two  
 parts, one of which escaped. The fate  
 of the other fleet I do not know."

WHAT BEFEL U-BOATS WHEN  
TRAWLERS WENT FISHING

Baltimore, June 2.—The disappear-  
 ance of a squadron of German subma-  
 rines was described yesterday by Karl  
 Arthur Bowman, a Finn, ship carpenter  
 on the steamer St. Theodore, who  
 has just been discharged from the  
 University Hospital, following an opera-  
 tion.

"It was near Dublin Bay," he said.  
 "We left Liverpool for Baltimore, but  
 a British patrol boat overhauled us  
 and made us put into Dublin Bay. Other  
 steamers were there which had been  
 held up too.

"Submarines, the British officers  
 told us. They were coming round by  
 the north of Scotland and the patrol  
 cruisers and trawlers had set out to  
 bag them.

"All traffic past Dublin Bay was  
 held up for more than a week and in  
 this time the trawlers had swung nets  
 through all the passages and lay in  
 wait for the victims. The British patrol  
 had got warning.

"All we could get from the patrol  
 commanders was 'wait.' This was  
 each day. At the end of our seventh  
 day one of the patrol officers came on  
 board and said it was all right for us  
 to go.

"He didn't say much more or let on  
 what happened. He laughed when the  
 captain asked him if the nets caught  
 the game, but wouldn't admit anything  
 except that the nets had been taken up  
 again."

 Dessie Crockett, have returned home.

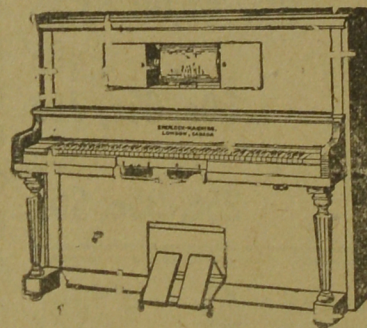

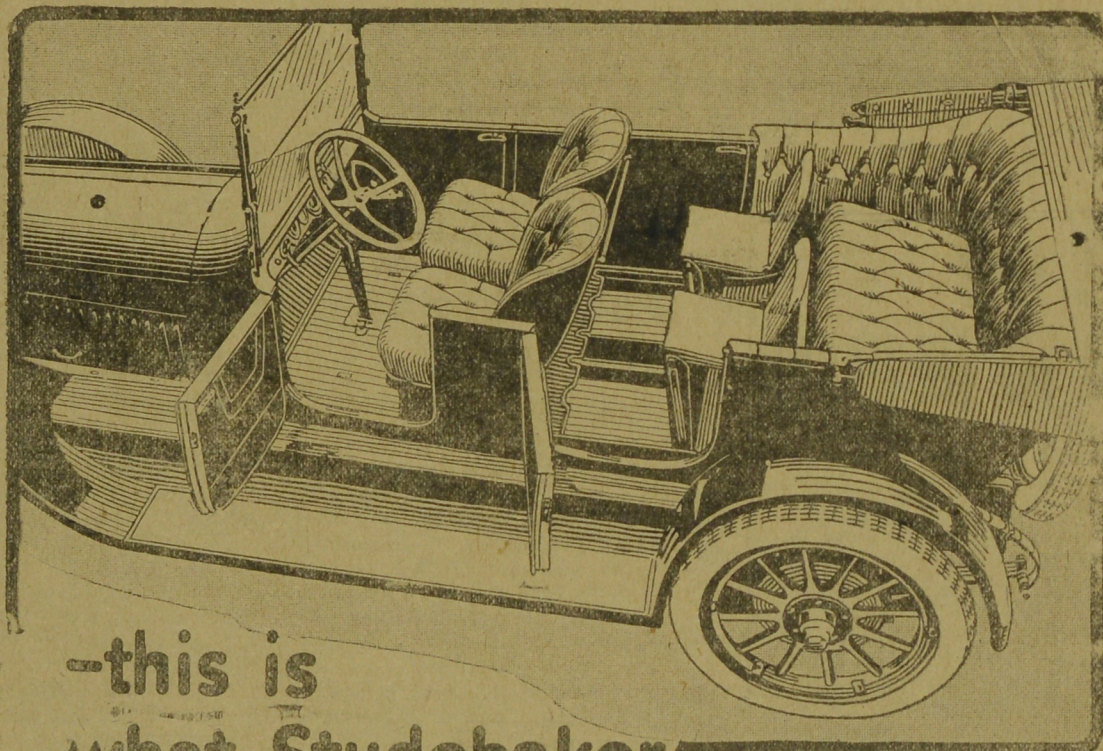
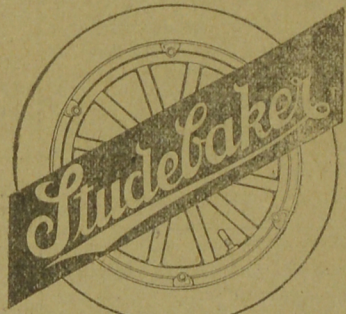
