In the Casualty List.

Late George M. Foster.

The funeral of the late George M. Foster took place this afternoon, Rev. Mr. Ainsworth conducting the service. Interment was made at Burton. The deceased passed away on Saturday in his 73rd year. A widow, one son, Chester, and one daughter, Josephine, survive. Dr. B. C. Foster and Mr. Rainsford Foster, are brothers.

Caught Smuggling.

Three special officers of the Customs Department, two men and a woman, boarded the train from Houlton to Debec Junction Saturday night and compelled all passengers to submit to examination for contraband goods. Outer garments were removed in many cases and a large quantity of American goods in the process of being smuggled was discovered. People of Woodstock and other places who had been shopping in Houlton, Me., were "caught" in numbers. Petty smuggling had become a custom in that part of the country.

Inspecting Mining Property.

Mr. C. Noble Crowe, of Bridgewater, N.S., formerly mine manager for the Canadian Antimony Co., spent two days at Lake George last week in the company of two strangers, reported to be New York capitalists. Mr. Crowe holds a mining lease of a large tract of land in the vicinity of the antimony mines, and it is reported that he is endeavoring to interest outside capitalists with a view of developing the property. It is a well known fact that antimony is cropping out of the ground at Lake George on land other than that under lease to the New Brunswick Metals, Limited.

Mrs. Kate Logan, widow of the late George Robinson Logan, died at her home in Gibson Saturday night, following a brief illness. She was aged 57 years. Three sons survive. They are J. Edgar, of Fredericton, Harold R. of Gibson, and Hayward C., of Boston. Four sisters also survive. They are Mrs. Geo. Armstrong, of St. Marys; Mrs. Henry Cameron, of Barker's Pt.; Mrs. Ward Belyea, of East Somerville, Mass., and Miss Alma Flewelling, of East Dedham, Mass. The funeral will take place at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Rev. E. E. Lake conducting the service.

MRS. INA ROY ARRESTED FOR DESERTING CHILDREN

Mrs. M. A. Roy, who deserted her two little children here some time ago, was arrested in St. John Saturday afternoon on advices from Chief of Police McCollom of this city.

Chief McCollom went to St. John this morning with a warrant and will bring the prisoner back tonight. She had been working in a restaurant at Seaside Park.

Mrs. Roy is the wife of Private Jas. Roy of the Royal Canadian Regiment. She is 23 years of age. One of her children is aged 2 years and one but a few months. Since her husband departed she was receiving half of his pay and a separation allowance. When it was learned by Police Magistrate Limerick that she had left her children, he telegraphed to Ottawa and had all payments held up. In the meantime the children have been boarded on the guarantee of the court that the bills will be paid. It is probable that future payments to the woman will be made through the magistrate.

At the time Mrs. Roy left Fredericton it was reported that she had eloped with a local man, but this afterward was denied.

TROOPS MAY REMAIN HERE FOR MORE THAN WEEK

Nothing Definite Known--140th Detachment Transfers Men to St. John--Recruits Coming in for Various Units

It is reported now that the infantry detachments now quartered here are likely to remain for upwards of a week longer. Nothing definite is known concerning their departure, but circumstances now point to no movement before the end of the week, at least.

C Company, 140th Battalion, transferred a number of men to the base company at St. John and they left this morning under the command of Sergt. Morehouse.

Included in the party were Privates Evans, James Venner, W. A. Adair, W. A. McKinnon, William Belyea, and Geo. Crowley. The men were surplus to the strength of C Company.

MEDUCTIC MYSTERY CLEARED UP BY FINDING REMAINS

Body of Edna Porter Found in Salmon Net Near Carson Station--Circumstances Point to Accidental Drowning.

The mysterious disappearance of Miss Edna Porter, daughter of Mr. Sherman Porter, of Meductic, was cleared up last week by the discovery of her body in a salmon net at Lower Dumfries.

The body was found Thursday evening and was taken to Meductic by the St. John and Quebec Railway on the day following, interment being made there.

The remains were discovered in the salmon net of Mr. Benj. Griffin, near Carson Station. Relatives identified them and Dr. Turner, after making an examination, stated that there were no evidences of foul play. Circumstances all point to death by drowning, but whether accidental or intentional never will be known. Public opinion generally favors the theory of suicide.

The girl was sixteen years of age, and was last seen alive on the afternoon of Wednesday, May 17. At that time she started off for a walk, saying she was going to the cemetery.

Death of a Child.

The death occurred yesterday of James W. Drew, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Drew, of Marysville. The funeral took place this afternoon, Rev. Mr. Hicks conducted the service and interment was made at the Methodist cemetery, Marysville.

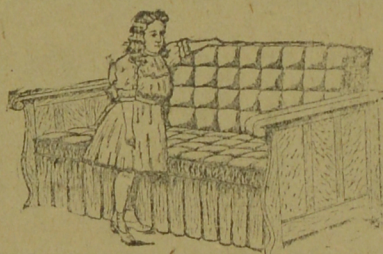

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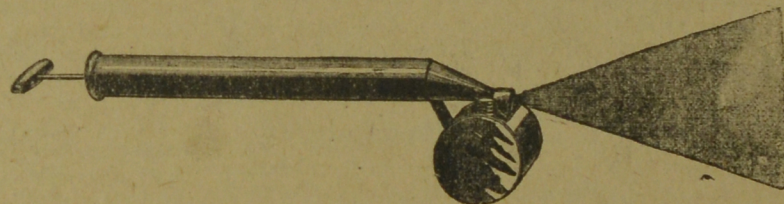
