is taken by the cabinet, the claims of various ministers may be discussed and some are already speaking of Lloyd George in this connection, but the Minister of Munitions has his hands full with the Irish question just now."

Premier Asquith temporarily has taken personal charge of the War Office.

At the suggestion of the Jockey Club, the Windsor race meeting, which was to have been held this week, has been cancelled on account of Earl Kitchener's death.

SENSATION IN HOLLAND.

AMSTERDAM, June 7.—A sensation was caused in Holland by the death of Lord Kitchener, those sympathizing with the Allies expressing profound regret, and German circles claiming that the death of the British war secretary is better news than a German victory in the field. The Dutch newspapers pay tribute to Lord Kitchener's military achievements.

THE ITALIAN PUBLIC DISMAYED.

ROME, June 7.—The news of the death of Field Marshal Kitchener caused a profound feeling of dismay among the Italian public. The King and General Cadorna, commander in chief of the Italian army, sent telegrams of condolence to King George. The Pope instructed Archbishop Bourne of Westminster to convey his sympathy to the British monarch.
