Young Blades Scored a Win Over Young Carney at Woonsocket—Could not finish round

Woonsocket, June 5—Young Blades of Woonsocket, defeated Young Carney of New Bedford, in a peculiar manner at the Coliseum tonight. In the ninth round the men were hammering away when the bell rang. Just after it sounded, Blades hit Carney a blow which put the New Bedford man out. He recovered before the tenth round, however, was called and although he attempted to fight, was sent down and out again. Blades had the advantage of the fight at all stages.

Young O'Neill of Woonsocket, who has been out of the ring for two years, performed a comeback stunt and defeated Young Lajoie of Northampton, in eight rounds. Young Goula of Woonsocket, knocked Al Gardner of Milford, out in the second round, and Young Tellier of Woonsocket, stopped Young Arthur of Providence, in the second.

HOME-RUN DRIVE
INTO BLEACHERS IS
PROTESTED BY GRIFFITH

Claims That Ground-rule With so Great Crowd on Field Made Hit Only Two-Base.

Detroit, Mich., June 5—Manager Clarke Griffith has made up his mind to lodge a protest with Ban Johnson on Umpire Connolly's decision which gave Veach a home run on a drive which bounded into the bleachers, in the eighth inning of today's game with Washington, and incidentally won the game for the Tigers.

Griffith notified the umpire when the play came up that he would continue under protest, and he believed that the league executive will have to order the contest re-played. The hit which started the argument was a long fly to right that went over the low screen into the open stand on one bound. Ropes had been stretched to hold back an overflow crowd earlier in the afternoon, and the umpires had announced that any ball driven into this crowd of past the ropes would be good for two bases only. Griffith contends Veach's ball hit inside the restricted territory, and thus was good for but two bases, regardless of where it may have bounded subsequently.

FROM BIG LEAGUES

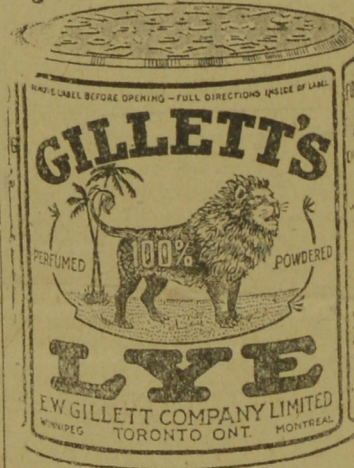
Star Pitcher of Villa Nova College is much sought After—Is Right-Handed With Lots of Speed.

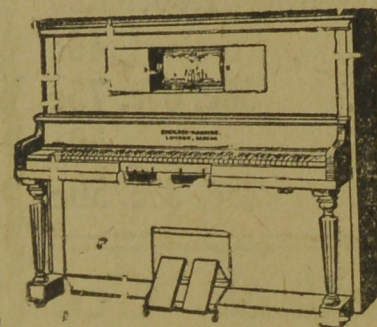

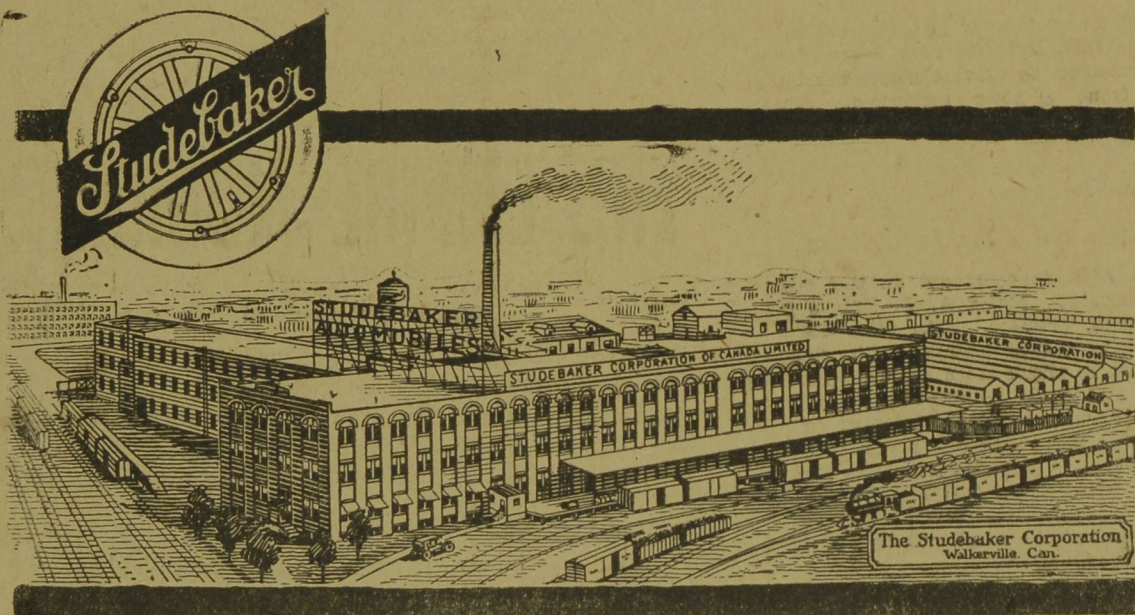

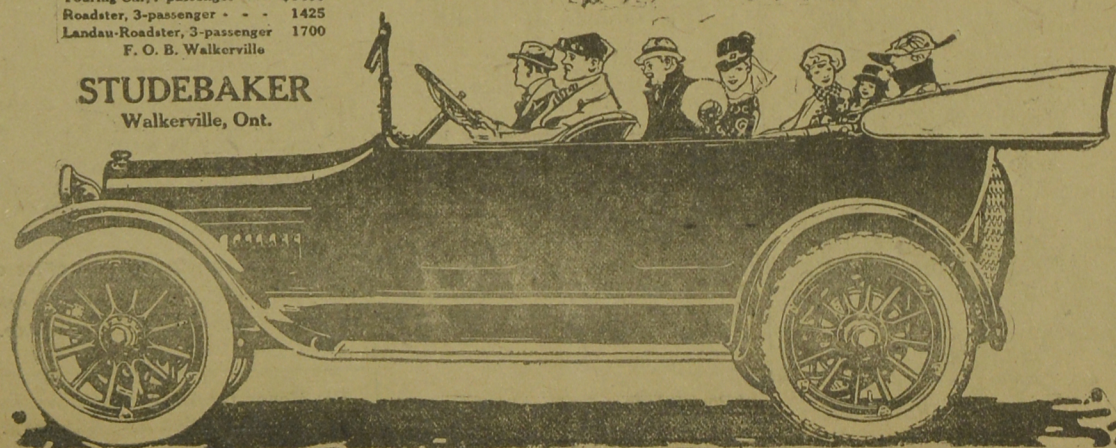
