before I was even born?"

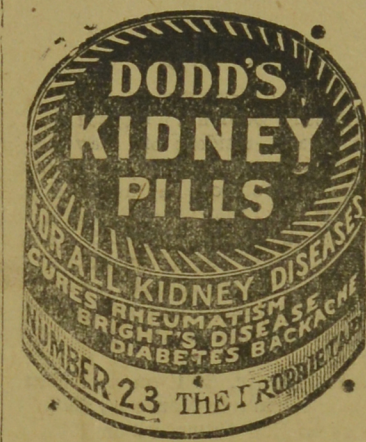
A flush crept slowly across the

## -Woman's Column-

SOME NEW RECIPES

Prepared by New England Housewives  
Best of All Good Cooks.

**Prune Whip**—Take 1 cup of  
prune pulp, whites of 2 eggs, 1-3  
to 1-2 cup of sugar (granulated or  
confectionery), orange or lemon  
juice, if desired. Wash prunes  
and soak until soft; cook until very  
tender. Remove stones and chop  
prunes very fine. Cook until thick.  
Beat whites very stiff, add confec-  
tionery sugar and when prune  
pulp is cool, fold in the white of  
egg. Bake in a moderate oven un-  
til puffed and firm to the touch.  
Serve with cream or soft custard.

**Ice Cream Cake**—Make a good  
sponge cake, bake  $\frac{1}{2}$  an inch thick  
in jelly pans, let them get perfect-  
ly cold; take a pint of the thickest  
sweet cream, beat until it looks  
like ice cream, make very sweet  
and flavor with vanilla; blanch and  
chop a pound of almonds, stir into  
cream and put very thick between  
the layers.

**Apple Sauce Cake**—One cup of  
apple sauce and 1 teaspoon soda  
dissolved in the sauce, 1 cup sugar,  
1 heaping tablespoon butter, 1  
cup flour and a little salt,  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup  
currants, then frost.

One may sometimes omit cur-  
rants and use 1 cup nut meats in  
their place, frost with white frost-  
ing and place nut halves over top  
and sides of cake.

**Orange Cake**—Two cups sugar,  
4 eggs, leaving out whites of two;  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup butter, 1 of water, 2 tea-  
spoons baking powder, 3 cups flour,  
juice of grated rind and pulp of 1  
orange, using the remaining whites  
for frosting on top.

## HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

To peel tomatoes without scald-  
ing, scrape carefully with the back  
of a knife or the blade of a dull  
knife, after which the tomatoes  
will peel easily.

All green vegetables should be  
laid in cold salt water for 1 hour  
before they are cooked. This draws  
out all the insects they contain.  
Carrots should be scraped, then  
cut up and thrown into cold water  
till they are cooked. Turnips must  
be peeled thickly, then cut up and  
thrown into cold water until they  
are cooked. Onions must be peel-  
ed, then, as a rule, sliced or chop-  
ped.

Green vegetables should be put  
into boiling water with a little salt  
and a small piece of soda, boiled  
quickly for a few minutes and then  
simmered until tender.

The sink, table and stove should  
be of such a height as to permit  
the person using them to work  
with comfort without stooping.

To water house plants a bread  
pan is found to be very convenient.  
Pouring the water from the corner  
of the pan avoids the usual spill-  
ing of the water.
