Orders were out for the 132nd North Shore Battalion to leave for Valcartier on June 9, but have been cancelled.

OROMOCTO MAN  
PASSED AWAY IN  
HIS 104TH YEAR

Timothy Sullivan Born in Cork, Ireland March 16, 1813--Came to New Brunswick in the Year 1845.

Timothy Sullivan, reputed to be the oldest resident of New Brunswick, passed away last night at his home in Oromocto in the 104th year of his age. The deceased was a well known and highly respected resident of Oromocto. His advanced age had made him a person of more than local prominence and he had many friends throughout this part of the province.

The late Mr. Sullivan was born at Cork, Ireland, on March 16, 1813. He came to New Brunswick in 1845, settling at Oromocto. He is survived by eight children, four sons and four daughters. They are John, Florentine and Daniel of Lewiston, Me., and Timothy of Oromocto, Mrs. Annie Dargan of Portland, Me., Mrs. Catherine Burns of Lewiston, Me., Mrs. Henry Casey of Millocket, Me., and Miss Bridget, at home. There are also numerous grandchildren.

The funeral will take place Friday morning with High Mass celebrated at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul at 10.30 by Rev. Father Carleton.

The deceased was in an excellent state of health up to within a short time before his death and had his faculties unimpaired.

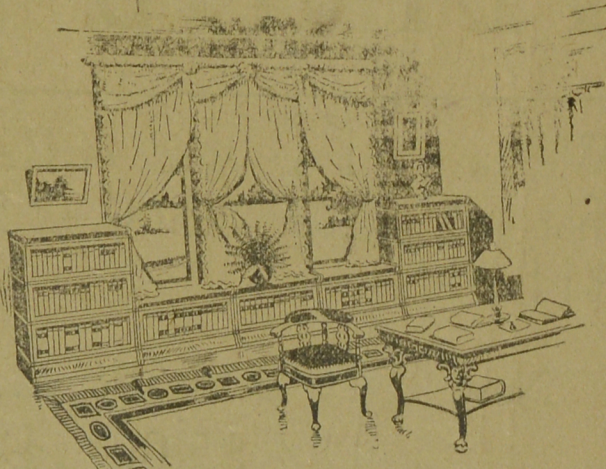

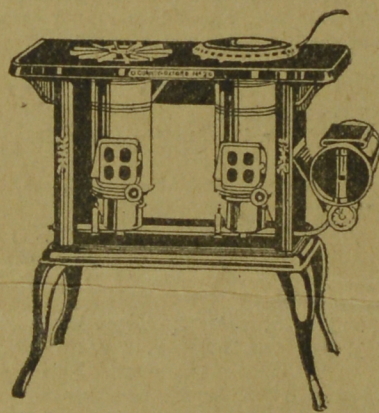
