RUSSIANS HOLDING THEIR LINE AGAINST HEAVY ODDS

LONDON, June 27.—According to the latest Vienna official communication, the Austro-Germans have effected a breach in the Russian front in the Lutsk salient, near the Svidniki bridgehead, an important position on the direct road to Kovel. This statement is in contradiction to the Petrograd report, but it probably was issued later. Otherwise than in the Lutsk region neither side has made any headway in this theatre.

The Times correspondent at the Russian headquarters on this front explains the facility with which the Germans can reinforce their lines, and says this makes the maintaining of the Russian positions here very difficult.

"The Russians," says the correspondent, are holding their line against heavy odds. The situation is excellent now, but with the German system of railways behind their lines it is clear that the issue depends on the extent to which the Germans are able to drain their other fronts and to keep sending fresh troops for concentrations at this point. It must be remembered that the Russians are holding lines nearly a thousand miles long and that it is impossible for the Russians to effect concentrations at the same speed as the Germans."

POLICE INVESTIGATION CONTINUED MONDAY

Large Number of Witnesses Examined
---James Driscoll of St. John Heard.

The investigation into the charges against Chief McCollom and Policeman Marshall was continued yesterday afternoon. James Driscoll, proprietor of the Hotel Edward, St. John, was the star witness. Others were E. H. Mooers, John Malloy, William Lyons, Walter Beiderman, William Saunders, William Duncan, J. J. McCaffrey, J. E. Sullivan, H. E. Dewar, N. Beck and "Scotty" Mullin.

Some of the witnesses were connected with charges against Policeman Marshall. As before, the inquiry was in private and the Commissioners refused to give out any information. The inquiry was continued this afternoon.

Mr. Driscoll, it is said, expressed indignation on account of being brought here as a witness, claiming that it would injure his hotel. He is said to have made statements to the effect that he had no ill feeling against Chief McCollom on account of anything the latter had done while a member of the St. John police force, also that he had informed the Police Commission that Chief McCollom had spent a night at his hotel in St. John last August, accompanied by his wife.

A new charge was laid against Chief McCollom yesterday by ex-Policeman Saunders, to the effect that the Chief loitered about the Queen Hotel.

ALL ABOARD FOR TRIP-ROUND- THE-WORLD

The big sensation in Fredericton tomorrow will be the Grand Patriotic Fete to raise funds for Patriotic and Red Cross purposes, and from what is heard in the homes and streets of the city, everybody is going to assist in the good cause. The widow's mite will be just as acceptable as the rich man's dollars.

The auto excursion to the headquarters of the Allied Nations will be one of the big features of the day. More than fifty motor cars will be engaged, divided into trains of four cars each. All cars are to be promptly on hand at Court House Square at 1.30 p.m., and chauffeurs will take their orders from Chief Train Dispatcher R. Z. Walker. Trains will follow each other at intervals of ten minutes. The route will cover fifteen miles and with the stations is as follows:

1. Belgium—University of N. B., via Queen, Regent, King and University avenue.
2. Scotland—Mrs. P. M. McDonald's, via University Avenue and Waterloo Row.
3. Canada—Experimental Farm, via river road.
4. Japan—Mrs. A. J. Gregory's, on return from Canada.
5. England—Mrs. R. G. Lee's, via Waterloo Row, Queen, Westmorland and Brunswick streets.
6. Holland—Mrs. David Richard's, St. Marys, via Brunswick, Northumberland, King and Carleton streets and the highway bridge.
7. Spain—Mrs. Dr. VanWart's, via highway bridge, Queen and York Sts.
8. France—Mrs. Dr. Allen's, via Brunswick street.
9. Ireland—Mrs. Lynch's, via Church and King streets, University avenue, Charlotte and Regent streets.
10. Italy—Mrs. H. H. Gunter's, via Regent, King and University avenue.
11. Russia—Officers' Square, via George, Regent and Queen streets.

The tour will end at Officers' Square and here the decorations will be elaborate. Supper for 35 cents will be served on the lawn and in the evening there will be music, etc.

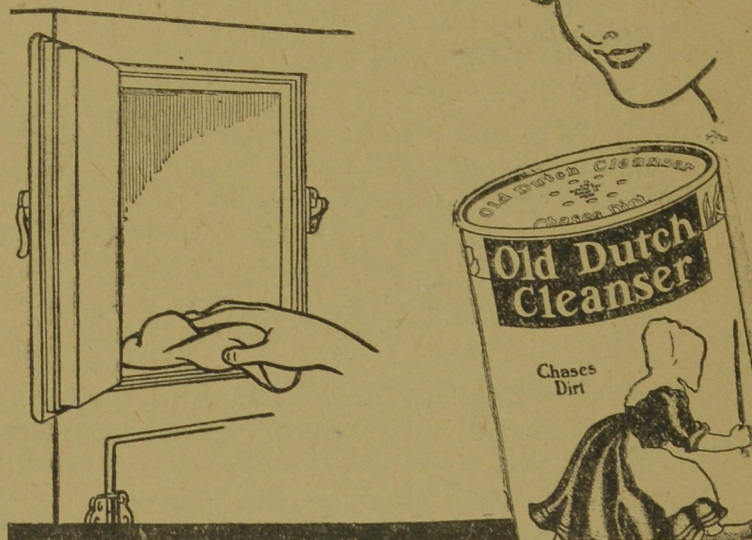
