the brow, where the tan began. At

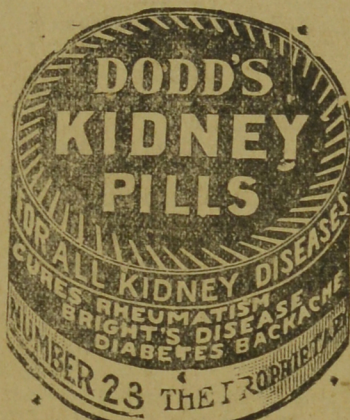
Tilda's summons, though, she put

BELGIAN REFUGEES

WERE ON BOARD

Rotterdam, June 26.—The British
steamer Brussels, which was recently
captured by German destroyers and
taken into Zeebrugge, was commanded
by Captain Charles Fryatt. She car-
ried an all British crew of forty-four.
There was an unusually large number
of Belgian women and children re-
fugees on board the vessel. Included in
the cargo were 400 tons of margarine,
quantities of fish, butter and yeast.

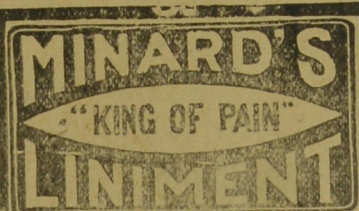
