HOTEL MENUES MUST BE CURTAILED

London, Nov. 23.— Walter Runci man, President of the Board of Trade addressing a meeting of leading Lon don hotel keepers, demanded an im mediate curtailment of menus. He declared there must be an immediate and drastic cutting down and a decrease in the use of imported foods.

"I have just seen," he said, "a speci men of a Christmas menu which is be ing circulated as an advertisement by a leading London hotel. Such an elah orate programme would be wasteful even in times of peace, and is a little short of scandalous in war times. Such a situation cannot be allowed. All menus must be drastically cut down and there must be one or two fishless and meatless days weekly. There must be an immediate decrease in the use of imported foods. Waste is especially notable in the use of expensive cakes and confectionery.

"If the trade interests will not take the necessary action, the government must force them to do so."
