

# FORMAL OPENING OF GOLF CLUB THIS AFTERNOON

Tea Served at Club-House---Foursome Will Officially Open the Course---Club Starts With Almost Full Membership---Six-Hole Course Now Available---Complete Course Will be Nine-Hole.

The formal opening of the new club house and course of the Fredericton Golf Club is taking place this afternoon. A foursome, with officers of the newly organized club playing, will be the first match over the course. Tea is to be served by the ladies of the club. The president, Mr. R. F. Randolph, will deliver a short address declaring the club house open. Guests will be taken by motors to the club house, running from the Parliament Square after 3 p.m.

The golf club starts with a membership of one hundred and eighteen—sixty gentlemen and fifty-eight ladies. There is a waiting list of three gentlemen, the membership for this season being limited to sixty of each sex. Next season there will be an initiation fee of ten dollars for gentlemen and five dollars for ladies, in addition to the membership fee.

## The Club House.

The club house is ready for occupancy. It is situated on the highest point of the property acquired by the club and from it a magnificent view of the city, the St. John river, the Nashwaak Valley and the islands in the St. John river can be obtained. Verandas fourteen feet in width are on two sides of the building. The interior is divided into a kitchen, gentlemen's room, ladies' room and common room. The kitchen is equipped and ready for use, and spring water is piped into the building. Lockers for all members have been installed.

## A Magnificent Course.

The course, when completed—probably next autumn—will have nine holes. Experts say it will be a magnificent course on account of its diversified nature and the natural hazards which abound. No permanent greens are yet available, but six are now being made. These will be available at the beginning of next season. The property, which formerly was the George Kitchen farm, is partially under crop and on that account is not

fully available. What will eventually be the second hole has aroused the enthusiasm of the experienced golfers who have seen it. It is a natural green and is a "blind hole." It will not be in use until next season.

## HUNT FOR SHIRKERS AT NEWMARKET

London, Sept. 13.—Military police carried out an extensive raid for shirkers from military service today at the Newmarket race course, just before the race for the classic St. Leger was started.

Racing has been in abeyance for over a month, and thousands of men attended. Every one of apparent military age, including reporters, jockeys, bookmakers, betters, race course officials and grooms were compelled to give an account of themselves as they entered and the soldier policemen demanded the production of either an attestation of registration card or, in the absence of this, a birth or exemption certificate. In the principal enclosure the first hour's proceedings were almost fruitless, producing only two slackers, who both declared themselves Irishmen and not liable to registration.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.

Subscriptions must be for even hundreds of dollars.

In case of partial allotments the surplus deposit will be applied towards payment of the amount due on the October instalment.

Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on allotments made in respect of applications bearing their stamp, provided, however, that no commission will be allowed in respect of the amount of any allotment paid for by the surrender of bonds issued under the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915. No commission will be allowed in respect of applications on forms which have not been printed by the King's Printer.
