CONTRACTORS HELD UP FOR LARGE SUMS OF MONEY

More Charges by Mr. H. M. Blair, Secretary Of the Public Works Department--Alleged Hold up Took Place When Valley Railway Accounts Were Settled up Last Fall and Proof Will be Forth-coming.

Woodstock, Sept. 13.—A sensation was sprung at the Lakeville meeting last evening by H. M. Blair, former Deputy Minister of Public Works. Messrs. Veniot and Adair were advertised to address the meeting, and when they had done so, Chairman King invited any one, Conservative or Liberal, to address the audience.

There was no response for a moment, until someone shouted: "Harry Blair is a good Tory; let him talk."

The chairman called on Blair, and for half an hour there was at times a shouting crowd and at other times intense listening to the speaker. Blair did not mince matters. He enlarged upon his affidavit and told them that at the present time the treasury chest was empty and the accounts were being tucked away to be paid after the close of the financial year, and so create the impression that the bills had all been paid and a surplus remained in the treasury.

A Most Serious Statement.

But the most serious statement Mr. Blair made was that railway contractors had been held up when the accounts were settled by the Government last fall, and large sums demanded to expedite the settlement with the Government, and that a prominent member of the Government had knowledge of this and consented to it. He says the checks by which payment was made are in existence and will be produced before the campaign was over.

Another statement he made was that he had acted since 1912 as the agent of others and paid large sums to members of the Legislature to influence their vote upon certain measures. This, he said, he was prepared to prove at any time there was an investigation.

The very great gravity of these

statements was realized by those present, and little else is talked of today. Blair apparently did not spare his own party in regard to these transactions. He told how for years he had been a blind and unquestioning follower of those corrupt legislators; that he was their instrument and they had used him to the limit.

He paid his respects to the Government papers, the Gleaner and Standard, saying he was not sure when he got up in the morning whether he had spoken the night before or not, as the Gleaner and the Standard had represented him as speaking at opposition meetings when he was actually in Maine, and again when he was actually present at a government meeting. He said he was not in the county at the request of the Opposition. His affidavit and statement had been prepared when the Opposition organizer, Mr. E. S. Carter, was in Westmorland. In spite of what the Government press said, he was just as ready to speak at a Government meeting as at an Opposition gathering.

A Desperate Appeal.

Much amusement was caused last evening by the advice of a visiting M. P., whose voice carries like a megaphone. He emphatically advised a small group of fellow-speakers to accuse the Opposition of slander. "That is our winning argument," he said, "to create the impression that we are being slandered."

Last evening's meeting at Johnville gave Andrew McCain a splendid reception and George W. Upham got another at Lower Brighton. Both of the Opposition candidates are energetic business men, and every evening their presentation of the policy of the Opposition meets with warm approval.

A committee consisting of Messrs. C. A. Sampson, A. C. M. Lawson and Howard Rogers was appointed to consider the question of a successor to Rev. Mr. Marshall, and report to the next meeting of the board.

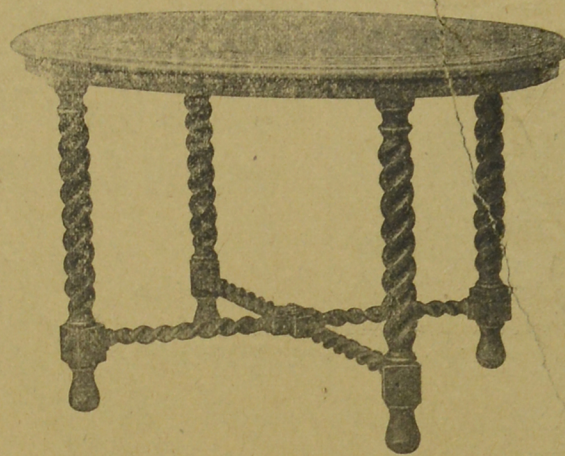
Reported Missing.

On Hunting Trip.

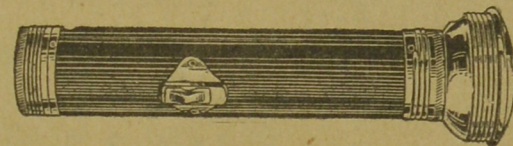
