Life-Saving Apparatus.

The latter is being brought from Shelburne, N. S. The two steamers, Viking and Hampstead, are to be operated under the charter of the Hampstead Steamship Company.

Death at Marysville.
Burlford Harrison, aged 15 years, died yesterday at his home in Marysville after being ill with typhoid for four weeks. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Harrison, survive, also four brothers, Percy, with the 104th Battalion in England, Harry and Elbridge, with the Army Medical Corps depot at St. John, and Lee, at home. The funeral will take place at 2.30 p. m. Friday, Rev. Mr. Barrass and Rev. Dr. Harrison conducting the service. Interment will be made in the Baptist cemetery.

To Go Overseas.
Miss Marion Crocket, daughter of Mr. W. C. Crocket, who is to go overseas as a nurse, left last evening for Montreal, and will sail for England in the course of a few days. A large number of friends were at the depot to say farewell and extend good wishes. Miss Crocket has the distinction of being the first lady to leave this city for service overseas. She is a bright and capable young woman and will undoubtedly give a good account of herself in the work in which she is engaged.

Caught a Big Fish.
The season for salmon fishing with rod and line ends tomorrow. On account of the low water the fishing has been exceptionally good at the Hart's Island pool this season. Upwards of one hundred salmon and grilse have been caught. On Monday Mr. H. B. Atherton killed a fish which tipped the scales at seventeen pounds, being the largest taken there this season. Mr. Atherton's total catch for the season numbers 25 salmon, which is surpassed by only one other sportsman, Mr. H. G. Chestnut, who has 40 to his credit.

LANGLEY BROTHERS IMPLICATED AGAIN IN THEFT CASE

Stole Seventy Dollars Yesterday from Relative--William Langley is Absentee From 236th Battalion Authorities Notified.

The Langley brothers, James and William, who, although in their teens, have long records as wrong-doers, are again wanted by the authorities. This time the offence is theft. A relative who is visiting her home in Gibson, is the victim. She alleges that the pair took seventy dollars from her trunk yesterday afternoon. Her story is that she entered her room hurriedly and found the two putting down the lid of the trunk. They left the room at once. She examined the trunk and found the money gone.

Last night she reported the theft to the police of this city and they are on the watch for the two.

William Langley, the elder brother, is wanted by the military authorities as an absentee. He enlisted here in the 236th Battalion several weeks ago. Last week he was transferred to the 140th Battalion and was warned to proceed to Valcartier with other men who were transferred. He was missing when the party left and after reporting to the 236th, again became an absentee.

James Langley, the younger of the two, is wanted for complicity in the thefts which took place in the spring and early summer, when he was an associate of Frank Smith, now in Gagetown jail.

TWO PIPERS FROM NEW YORK JOIN 236TH HIGHLANDERS

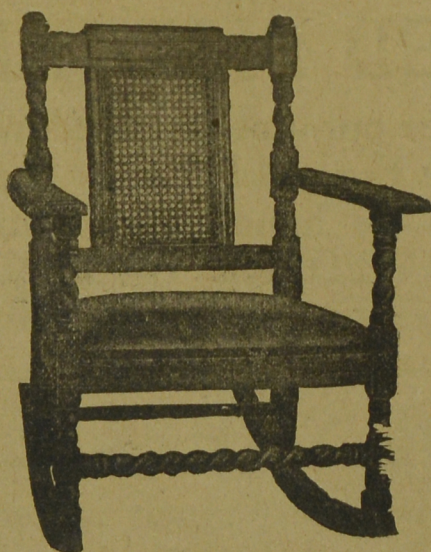

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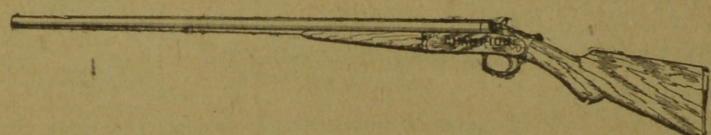
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
