GINNELL ADDRESSED SINN FEIN PRISONERS

Told Them That They Were Locked
Upon as Martyrs—Made Use of
An Assumed Name.

London, July 28.—Speeches which he had made to prisoners, describing them as martyrs, and demonstrations held by the prisoners when he visited them, were given as the reasons by the crown attorney why Lawrence Ginnell, Irish Nationalist member of parliament for Northwest Meath, has been refused permission to visit Irish prisoners in England, where hearing of the charge against him of attempting to gain admission into the Knutsford barracks was resumed in the Bow Street police court today.

The Crown Attorney said that when Ginnell visited the Irish prisoners at Stafford he told them they had done more for the Irish cause than anybody else, and that they were looked upon as martyrs. On a similar visit to the prison at Wandsworth there was a disturbance among the prisoners, who carried Ginnell around on their shoulders.

After the incident an order was issued refusing Ginnell permission to visit any place where Irish prisoners were detained, and he was arrested when he tried to gain admission to Knutsford Barracks under the name of Lebrics McFingle.

Lawrence Ginnell was arrested at the barracks on July 25. He protested to the magistrate against his arrest, saying there was no case against him. The name McFingle, he declared, was Irish for Ginnell, and the whole incident could easily be explained.

NARCOTICS SHUT OUT OF UNITED KINGDOM

London, July 28.—The importation of opium and cocaine into the United Kingdom has been prohibited by a royal proclamation issued today.

HOLLAND NOT AFRAID OF GERMAN REPRISALS

Will Not Allow Huns to Use Dutch
Canals For Transportation of
Munitions.

The Hague, July 28.—Holland has defied Germany and the threatened reprisals by the Kaiser's government in refusing the recent demand that she permit canal boats to go from Germany to Belgian territory through the Dutch canals, whatever their cargo.

Under international law, munitions of war cannot be permitted to pass through neutral territory, but Germany's anxiety to improve her transport facilities to the Belgian front, led her to demand that Holland violate this law.

The Dutch refusal has brought the demand to a crisis, and all here are anxiously awaiting to see whether Germany dare attempt to make good her threats.

The Case of Switzerland.

Germany's action in this case is on a par with her demands on Switzerland, which have not yet been settled. The Swiss frontier has been closed since early in the war, so far as the export of food stuffs is concerned, and Germany demands that the embargo be removed.

Switzerland has not yet replied, and does not have an international law to fall back on. Her action was taken in self-defence, since all her imports are at the mercy of the Allies, and if she permitted Germany to draw on her food supply she would soon be sharing the German shortage.

For a moment the little girl looked thoughtful, then her face became brilliantly illuminated.

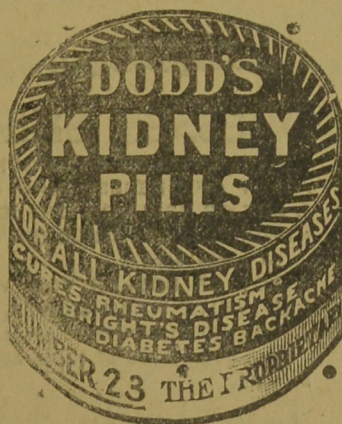
"Oh, mamma!" she enthusiastically exclaimed, "wouldn't it have been fine if you had married a Chinaman?"

HEAT WAVE SWEEPS OVER MIDDLE WEST

Chicago, July 28.—Illinois and states adjoining found no relief today from the unusual heat wave and there was a probability that the record of 100 degrees yesterday might be broken.

In Chicago, street thermometers early this morning stood at 89 degrees—higher by several degrees than the maximum of the night before.

Deaths directly due to the heat numbered 17 for the 24 hours ending at 6 o'clock this morning, according to reports received at the Central Police Station.

More than two score prostrations were reported.

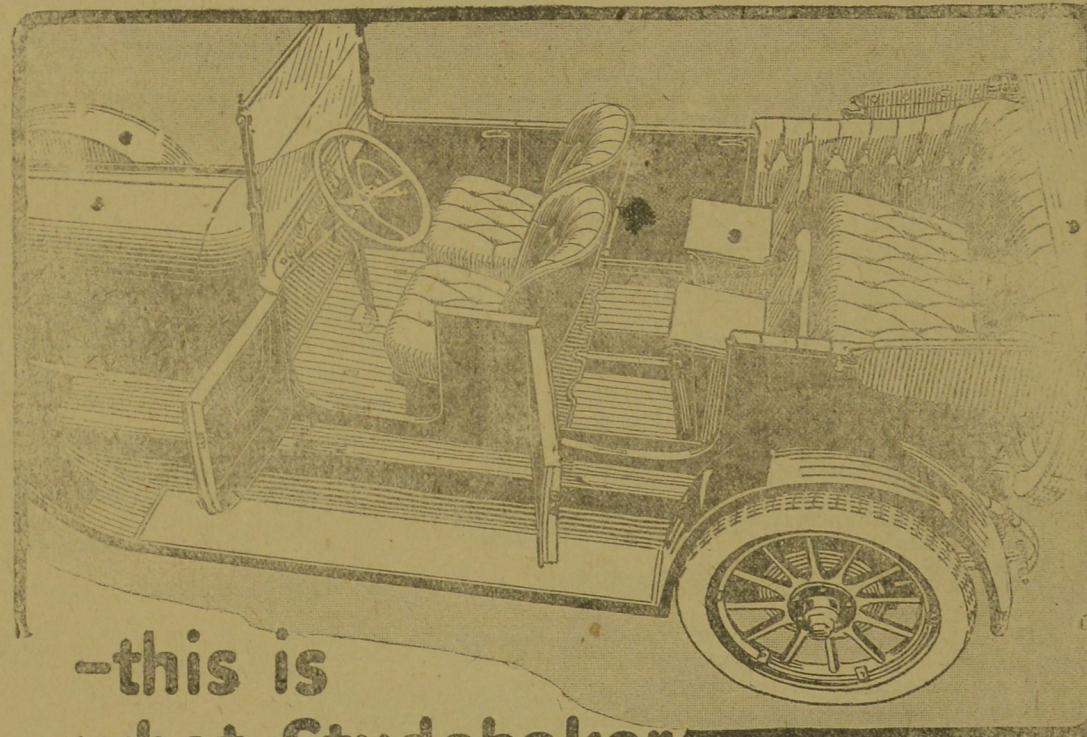

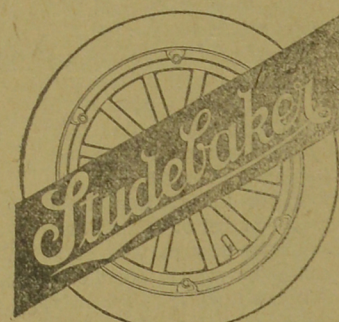
