UNDER SUPERVISION OF CANADIAN GOVERNMENT

Manager of International Nickel Company Gives Out Interview in Which He Denies Report

New York, July 28.—James L. Ashley, treasurer of the International Nickel Company, today reiterated that all sales of nickel made by his company since the beginning of the war have been under the supervision and control of the Canadian government.

Speaking of the alleged interview referred to in Canadian papers in which he is quoted as saying that he knew nothing of the reported refusal of the company to sell nickel to Germany and that the company could not refuse to sell nickel to any purchaser, Mr. Ashley denied that he ever gave any interview whatever upon this subject and denied that the statements which he is alleged to have made are correct.

"All sales of nickel made by the International Nickel Company since the

beginning of the war," Mr. Ashley said, "have been made under the direct control and supervision of the Canadian government."

MURDERER HANGED AT PRINCE ALBERT

Prince Albert, Sask., July 28.—Peter Nimolovitch, of Battleford, was hanged at 7 a.m. for the murder of a companion at Battleford.




