### FRENCH TROOPS. REPULSE GERMAN ASSAULTS

London, March 2—A British official statement issued tonight on the fighting in the western zone, says:

"We recaptured the trenches at the bluff of the Ypres-Cominas (anal. which were lost February 14, and also captured a small salient in the German line.

"A counter attack launched by the enemy some hours later was repulsed. German mine galleries in the captured trenches were destroyed. We have taken 180 prisoners, including four officers.

"There has been much artillery activity on both sides today from Vierstraet to Boesinghe."

Paris, March 2—German attacks of great violence, both artillery and infantry, have been resumed to the north of Verdun. The official statement issued by the war office tonight says that furious infantry assaults have been repulsed by the French troops, "whose fire decimated the ranks of the enemy."

### DIAMOND THIEF

#### MADE RICH HAUL

(Canadian Press)  
Chicago, Ill., March 3—The theft of diamonds, said to be valued at more than \$250,000, from Dreicer & Company, jewelers, was reported to the police early today.

According to Edward L. Smith, manager of the concern, which is located in the Blackstone Hotel, a well dressed man entered the store yesterday and asked to see some diamond rings. Smith brought out three trays, each containing twelve rings. After ten minutes' conversation with Manager Smith over the comparative merits of the rings, all set with large diamonds, the customer left the place, declaring himself dissatisfied.

Smith says he accompanied the stranger to the door and when he returned one of the trays with the diamonds was missing. Detectives were put on the case and when Smith was shown the photographs of a number of diamond thieves who are said to have operated in New York and other eastern cities, he recognized one as the man who had examined the diamonds in his store.

#### DIES IN CHICAGO

Chicago, March 3—Marie Marie Doro Marion, sixty-four years old, a former grand opera singer, died at her home here last night. Physicians said acute pleurisy caused her death. Madame Marion had made her home in Chicago for more than a quarter ago she was a member of the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York.

### EX-CATHOLIC PRIEST THE CAUSE OF RIOT

Chicago, March 2—A lecture on Civic and Religious Liberty by Dr. Joseph Slattery, a former Catholic priest and now a physician of Boston resulted in a riot in Boulevard Hall, 5505 South Halsted street, tonight. After several outbreaks among the audience and while a quartet was singing "America," fights started in the rear of the place and men and women were thrown into a panic.

Policeman Rooney, a former wrestler, is blamed by one of Dr. Slattery's party for much of the disorder. He charges that Rooney attempted to take the law of free speech into his own hands and instead of attempting to quiet disturbers who were pointed out to him, he ordered the speaker to quit talking, threatening to arrest him if he did not obey the order.

### WIFE MURDERER GOES TO THE CHAIR

Ossining, N.Y., March 2—Walter Watson of Brooklyn, was electrocuted at Sing Sing this morning for the murder of his wife in March, 1915. Watson protested his innocence to the last. He left a sealed envelope with a request that it be opened after his death. In it was found a faded flower and this note:

"This envelope contains a flower from off my dear wife's grave. Please bury it with me and let it be on my breast. It is a token of remembrance of the wife I always loved and may God rest our souls in peace."

Watson was separated from his wife at the time of the murder which he was supposed to have committed while under the influence of drink. His son Thomas, nineteen years of age, saw his father stab his mother with a table knife and assisted in his capture.

### AUSTRIAN LABORERS POSED AS RUSSIANS

(Canadian Press.)  
Stratford, Ont., March 3—Ten Austrians, posing as Russians, secured work as laborers in the G.T.R. shops here. Their disguise was too thin, however, for some real Russians employed in the big plant found that their supposed compatriots were unable to speak the Russian language. Yesterday the ten alien enemies were taken to an internment camp.

### German Zeppelins Brought Down

(Canadian Press)  
New York, March 3—A news agency despatch from London published here today, says:

"Two Zeppelins were wrecked in Belgium on February 21, according to Exchange Telegraph despatches from Amsterdam today.

"One of the Zeppelins, returning from the front, evidently was hit by enemy artillery," says the despatch. "It fell at Etzezee, damaging a house and injuring eighteen children. Another fell at Maisnault. The debris was loaded on a train bound for Cologne."

### German Troops Capture Village

(Canadian Press.)  
Berlin, March 3—Via London—German troops cleared the village of Doumont and pushed their lines to the west and to the south of the village and of the armed fort yesterday, according to the official announcement issued today by the German army headquarters staff.

### DANISH STEAMER HAS BEEN DETAINED

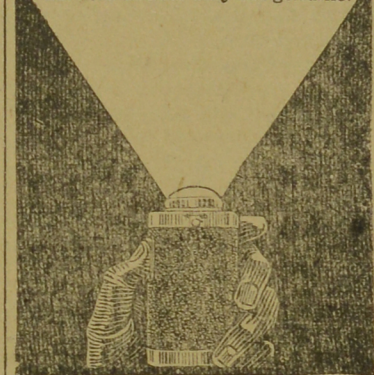

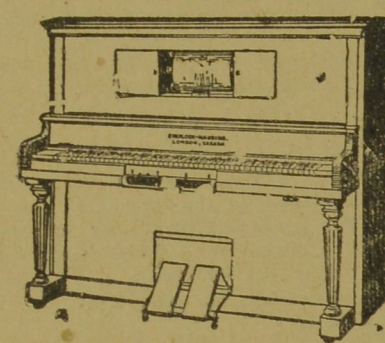
