WOUNDED SECOND
TIME IN FRANCE

In Trenches Only Three Weeks After Recovering From First Wound--
Ed. McDonald Wounded, Corp.
B. Inch Missing.

Soldiers from Fredericton and vicinity evidently were in the thick of the fighting on the Somme last week. Several of them appeared in the casualty lists issued yesterday and today.

Private Paul Bailey of this city has been wounded the second time. His mother, residing at 488 King street, received an official telegram stating that he had been admitted to No. 2 General Hospital at Hardelet, on September 27th, with gunshot wounds in the lower extremities. Private Bailey had been in the trenches only three weeks after recovering from his first wound. He went to France first with a draft from the 60th Battalion. As far as is known, he joined the 14th Battalion (Royal Montreal).

Private Edward McDonald has been wounded, according to a telegram received yesterday by his relatives, who reside in Chancery Lane. The official telegram stated that he had been admitted to No. 3 Stationary Hospital at Boulogne, with a gunshot wound in the head.

Private McDonald left Fredericton in August, 1914, with the first volunteers that left.

Oromocto Man Wounded.

Mr. Harry Cannon, of Oromocto, yesterday received an official telegram informing him that his brother, Private Fred Cannon, had been badly wounded in the chest on Sept. 28th.

Private Cannon left Oromocto four--

BULLETS CRASHED
THROUGH WINDOW
AND SIDES OF HOUSE

Boys' Rifle and Revolver Practice Ended in Police Court--Needham Street People Narrowly Escaped Being Hit.

Four boys, the youngest eleven years old, appeared in the police court this morning on the charge of carrying firearms without license and of discharging them within the city. Sitting Magistrate McCready remanded the three oldest to jail to await the return of the Police Magistrate. The youngest he allowed to go home to reappear when wanted.

Two revolvers and two rifles of small calibre were produced in court, and the boys all admitted carrying and discharging the firearms. The fathers of two of the boys were in court. The father of the other two is out of the city on a hunting trip.

Henry Watts, a resident of Needham street, informant in the case, appeared in court. At about two o'clock yesterday afternoon a bullet crashed through a window of his kitchen, passed close to him and to a woman standing in the room, and lodged in a wall after passing through a door panel. Other bullets passed through the shed and part of the house. Mr. Watts, on learning where the bullets were coming from, reported to the police.

Policeman Sturgeon took the case and rounded up the four boys. Three of them stayed in the cells all night and the youngest was allowed to go home, his father bringing him to court.

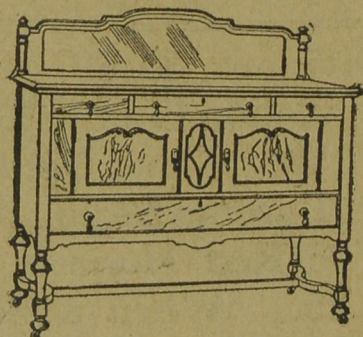
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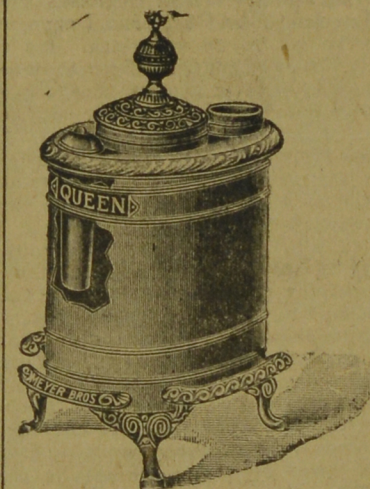
