RAFTING OPERATIONS WILL FINISH SHORTLY

Douglas Boom Will Close Next Week
On Account of fWater Being Low.

Rafting operations at the Douglas Boom will be completed next week. During the following week operations at the Mitchell boom will also be completed, although conditions are unfavorable on account of low water and easterly winds. The estimate of 50,000,000 feet of lumber rafted by the St. John River Log Driving Co. during the season of 1916 will not be exceeded. Operations have been going on slowly of late on account of slack current and low water. The river, however, is clear of lumber as far Springhill five miles above this city. Sacking of the western bank of the river is to begin at once. Logs are very few at the Douglas Boom. Two days' rafting next week should clean everything up. The plant will then be removed and final operations begin at the Mitchell Boom on lumber which has gone past the Douglas Boom.

CHILD RESUSCITATED BY RARE GOOD FORTUNE

Fell Into Cistern, Finally Taken Out
Apparently Dead—Doctor, Fortunately Pasing By.

Guelph, Ont., Aug. 31.—While playing around the yard the two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce McPhail of Rockwood, fell into a deep cistern in which there was about four feet of water.

Other children gave the alarm and help was soon at hand. Mr. Fred Hamilton went down into the cistern and got hold of the child, but efforts to get them both out failed, and the little fellow fell back into the water.

Mr. E. Carter descended to the bottom of the cistern and finding the child, managed to hold it above the water until those above were able to pull it to the surface. When taken out the little one was black in the face and apparently dead.

With rare good fortune a doctor was seen passing the house and he lost no time in starting measures for resuscitation. It was some time before his efforts were successful, but eventually the child was restored.

A SCARCITY OF WATER.
Truro's Town Reservoir Very Low—
Water Has "Vegetable Taste."

Over in the little town of Truro, N. S., they are suffering from a scarcity of water, if we are to believe the following from the Truro News:

"Considering the low state of the town reservoir, the water having more or less a vegetable taste, the health officer suggests that all water for domestic use should be boiled. There is no pumping yet from the river, but the water being low in the reservoir, it is considered wise to take this precaution."

London, Sept. 2.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the following:

"The Bulgars began a retirement from Sorovitch yesterday afternoon and are falling back toward the defiles of Kirdiervan and Banitza. Late last night detachments of Serbian cavalry arrived before Sorovitch."

"In a ravine near Gornichevo the Serbs discovered three Krupp guns abandoned by Bulgarians. Everything points to a retreat toward Monastir, and this may quite possibly be soon turned into a route."

Liquor Destroyed.

Liquor seized at the C. P. R. station and consigned to Harold Jack and other liquor seized at the Victoria Hotel, was destroyed at the police station last night.

From Patriotic Festival.

A statement of receipts in connection with the Patriotic Festival at the Officers' Square on August 28th, 29th and 30th, has been issued. It is as follows: Gross receipts, \$1,856.44; expenses, \$527.67; net receipts, \$1,328.77. This money was disposed of as follows: Daughters of the Empire, for Red Cross Work, \$419.29; Canadian Patriotic Fund, Fredericton Branch, \$338.58; British Sailors' Relief Fund, \$100. In addition to this is the sum of \$26.60 due from the Militia Department for lumber.
